REID MIXES IN; MAY BE RECALLED

If the Liberals Can Prove That Ambassador Gave Out Letter for Publication His Removal Will Be Demanded.

LONDON, Jan. 7.—Efforts are being made today to learn whether United States Ambassador Reid authorized the publication of a letter he wrote to Sir Charles Walpole, a protectionist candidate for parliament, which the protectionists are using as campaign material.

The Liberals are said to be behind the circulation. It is reported if they succeed in proving that the contents of the letter were made public under the ambassador's authorization they will charge Reid with interfering in English politics and may take steps looking toward his recall.

The letter in question concerned himself with the condition of the American unemployed. Reid is said to have furnished Walpole and other English protectionists such valuable material for their English "protection" fight.

CHAMBERLAIN FATHERS WATERPOWER MEASURE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—Senator Chamberlain has introduced a bill authorizing the Secretary of the Interior to withdraw from entry lands which may become valuable for water power, and authorizing the lease of such water power at rates and for periods fixed by the Secretary. Rates to be not less than one-half of one per cent of the gross receipts from water power for the preceding calendar year, nor more than one per cent of such receipts.

NEWSPAPER EXPOSE AS CURFEW SUBSTITUTE

NEWCASTLE, Pa., Jan. 7.—Chief of Police Riley, of Elwood, this county, believes in the efficiency of newspaper advertising. Since councils will not pass an ordinance to establish a curfew, Riley has decided to take the names of youngsters out late at night and publish them daily. Riley thinks this will force their parents to keep them at home.

McKinlay May Resign.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 7.—Congressman Duncan McKinlay, of California, today repeated his declaration that he would resign from Congress if he had done anything questionable when he purchased a coal claim in Alaska.

OLD JACK FROST MAKES GETAWAY

Weather Moderates and Coldest Snap Known in Southern Oregon for Years Is Broken.

Friday morning the people of Southern Oregon awoke to the fact that the weatherman had turned on a little—just a little—warmth and that Jack Frost who had held the country in his cold grasp for the past 10 days, had relaxed his grip and softer weather was the result.

The cold snap which has continued almost without intermission for 10 days was the most severe that Southern Oregon has experienced for at least 12 years. Definite data not at hand owing to the fact that there is no government weather station here, but 18 degrees is the lowest that has been reached for many years until the 2nd of January when at 7 o'clock the thermometer at the Southern Pacific depot registered 15. The same thermometer registered 29 on the 1st, 15 on the 2nd, 24 on the 3rd, 20 on the 4th, and 19 on the 5th. Twenty-six was the register this morning with cloudy skies and a skit of snow on the ground, and indications are good for softer weather.

At Ashland two inches of snow fell Thursday night.

AUTOMOBILIST EXPECTS TO BREAK ALL RECORDS

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—Louis Strang, automobile racer, arrived from New York today on his way to Los Angeles. He expected to remain here for several days arranging for an appearance here.
