HENEY REFUSES TO DISCUSS REMOVAL OF PINCHOT

PORTLAND, Or., Jan. 8.—Francis J. Heney, the San Francisco graft prosecutor, refuses to discuss the removal by President Taft of Gifford Pinchot as chief forester of the United States.

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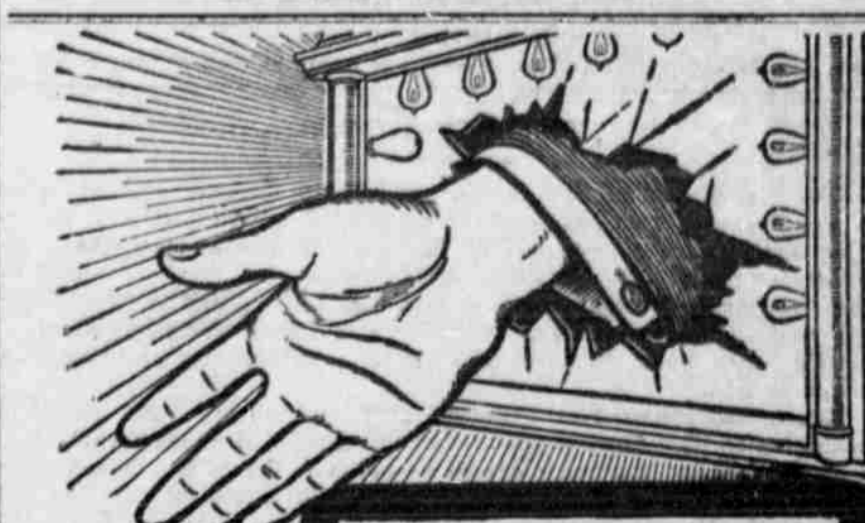
