



The following is from a Utah paper Total Amount of State Tax to Be Paid by Jackson County Largest in

History of County.

The county of Jackson will pay into the state treasury \$52,561.70, as its quota of the taxes levied for state purposes this year.

This is the greatest amount of money yet demanded by the state from this county, and the increase from year to year shows not only the constant growth in wealth of the county, but how the proportion has increased during the past vears: In 1907, Jackson county paid to the state \$36,110 as its proportion of taxes. In 1908, \$38,250 was the total sum, but for 1909, the state asks \$52,-561.70 as its share of the taxes due from this county. That the amount of state taxes jumps \$14,311 in one year shows that there has been an almost imprece-dented increase in values in spite of the fact that valuations were materially reduced in 1909 by the state board of tax commissioners.
