

NEAR BURGLARY WEARY'S PLACE

Two Yeggs Force Way Into a Saloon and Make Attack on Safe, But Are Frightened Away.

The saloon of Downing & Slinger on Front street was entered from the rear Sunday evening and an attempt made to crack the safe.

That they did not succeed is due to the fact that Charles Steele, the night bartender, had a sick son and had gone to the saloon about 10:30 to get a bottle of mineral water for the boy.

The idea of burglary that early in the evening never entered his head. He thought it was simply neglect on someone's part.

As he put his key in the door, however, he heard two men start for the back door and by the time he succeeded in opening the door the fellows had escaped in the darkness of the alley, taking their tools with them.

They had entered through a rear window by prying the top sash down and had then opened the back door to give them an avenue of escape.

That they had attacked the safe and probably had the proper tools was shown by the fact that the handle was badly sprung and bent, indicating a strong pressure.

A hand saw evidently taken from someone's wood pile was found in the back door, but nothing else in the way of tools.

SAYS AMERICA IS TROUBLE MAKER

Leader in Russo-Japanese War Movement Says America is a Great Peace Disturber.

TOKIO, Japan, Jan. 10.—"America is the great disturber of the peace of the Orient," declared Professor Tomizu, a famous leader of the Russo-Japanese war movement today.

Professor Tomizu, in commenting on the proposed plan of Secretary Knox to neutralize the railroads of Manchuria, severely condemned the United States for its efforts to do something that would in his opinion work havoc with the equality of the Orient.

Many of the leading statesmen of Japan, and some of the newspapers, continued today their attack on the neutralization plan.

Count Hayashi said that the American attitude in the matter was similar to that assumed when the triple alliance was formed to administer affairs in China and Japan after the Sino-Japanese war.

Newspapers and statesmen united today in asking why America proposes to neutralize the management of the railroads only in Manchuria, and why not in the rest of the world.

HOGS BRING HIGH PRICE IN PORTLAND

After Holidays Trade Continues in Very Gratifying Manner in Livestock Market.

PORTLAND, Jan. 10.—After the usual holiday quietness the market has recovered in a very gratifying manner. The cattle, hogs and sheep have brought good prices.

The attractive hog prices have brought out a goodly showing of Idaho stuff and shippers have returned well pleased with this market.

Cattle supplies are well cleaned up and a very active market is looked for from now on.

The sheep and lamb market has been very steady, with few arrivals, if we except the trainload of Montana sheep brought in a few days ago.

Indications are that all lines will maintain a level from now on, with none of the slumps which were features of the late before holidays.

The receipts at the yards have been very light, there being only 1295 cattle, 49 calves, 2661 sheep and 1699 hogs received during this week.

SHOOTS WIFE IN PRESENCE OF THREE SMALL BABES

MARTINEZ, Cal., Jan. 10.—The bodies of Louis Lincoln, a plumber, and his wife, lie side by side today in the Martinez morgue.

Lincoln died last evening from the effects of a bullet he directed into his body after he had shot and killed his wife in the presence of their three small children.

He recently served a term in the county jail here, following his conviction on a charge of battery brought by Mrs. Lincoln. While he was in prison Mrs. Lincoln secured a divorce. This is supposed to have been responsible for the murder and suicide.
