**Arbitrating-Alsoop Case.**

LONDON, Jan. 14.—Arrangements for the arbitration of the Alsoop claim between the United States and Chile are almost completed, according to an unofficial announcement today.

Arbitration as planned by King Edward in past disputes is almost certain to be followed in the present case. The plan involves the appointment of two or three experts, usually headed by an eminent lawyer, to hear and weigh the evidence on both sides and then submit a report and recommendations.

**ENGLISH TO BATTLE AT POLLS TOMORROW**

Both Sides Claim Victory—Seventy-four Seats in Parliament Are to Be Filled.

LONDON, Jan. 14.—Nominations in 74 parliamentary districts were made today preparatory to the elections tomorrow.

Of the 74 seats to be filled tomorrow the liberals have hitherto held 48, the conservatives 17 and the labor party nine.

The liberals and laborites allied in fighting this year's campaign and the conservatives must gain 21 seats to win the initial battle. It will be necessary also for the conservatives to maintain about this ratio to control the next house of commons.

Prominent conservatives predicted today that the party will win tomorrow by a majority of 50, but the liberals declared that they will hold their own and will probably gain.

**WILL HOLD CAUCUS TO PICK OUT COMMITTEE**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Congressman Dwight of New York, the "whip of the house," and Congressman Hayes of California, an insurgent leader, conferred with President Taft today and agreed to hold a caucus on the appointment of the members of the Ballinger investigating committee. Assurance was given that the committee would be appointed impartially.

It was also agreed that the future caucuses will be held in matters concerned with the performance of party pledges and that the subject of the caucus will be announced prior to the meeting.
