FREE SPEECH FIGHT IS NEARING AN END

Official Post Is Sentenced to Five Months—Counsel for Others Released. SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 15.—Louis Brazier, a 37-year subject and "officer" of the Industrial Workers of the World, author of such gems as "Meet Me in the Jungle, Louis," and "Hallelujah, I'm a Bum," and five members of the organization were sentenced by Justice George W. Stocker to serve from 15 days to five months for alleged conspiracy. Brazier drew the long sentence, having admitted that he came to Spokane from California to take part in the fight for free speech. James Wilson, organizer of the I. W. W., and editor of the Industrial Worker, and E. J. Foster, associate editor, who were sentenced to six months in the county jail for conspiracy on December 3, 1909, advised Justice Stocker that they have demitted their counsel and will not appeal from his decision to the Spokane county superior court, but will serve their time. Mayor Pratt looks upon this as a surrender on the part of the ringleaders, and says that the end of the trouble is in sight. Governor Hay praises the city and county officials for their stand in breaking up the anarchistic society, "the members of which," he says, "do not seem to be able to understand the idea of our form of government."

CENSUS BUREAU HAS DRAWN COLOR LINE

Fearsome Howl Is Heard From South Following Appointment of Negroes. WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—The census bureau has found it necessary to draw the color line. There was a fearsome howl from the south when it was announced that the director expected enumerators to secure statistics of the negroes as well as of the whites, and now that he has further stated, as a result of that howl, that negroes are to be appointed to collect figures regarding their race, the south is vociferating as loudly as before. Hence it is that Director Durand has found it desirable to explain the attitude of his bureau, and in an official letter sent to all census supervisors he directs that they select negroes to count members of their own race in those districts where two-fifths or more of the population consists of negroes. He does not "consider it desirable that in the south negroes should enumerate white families," and informs the supervisors that it will be necessary in many districts to appoint both a white and a negro enumerator.

ASTORIA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE WINS FIGHT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 15.—The Astoria Chamber of Commerce won a partial victory against the Great Northern, the Northern Pacific, the Astoria & Columbia River, the Oregon, Washington & Idaho, the Oregon Railroad & Navigation companies today before the interstate commerce commission. The commission held that the fact that the railroads provided tracks, warehouses and wharves at Portland, Seattle and Tacoma does not compel them to provide similar facilities at Astoria, but ruled that the existing rate of 10 cents per 100 pounds more on grain going to Astoria than on grain going to Portland was unreasonable, and should be reduced to not over 4 1/2 cents. Astoria had asked for the same as Portland on grain shipped from northwestern points.
