

MACKAY SAYS POSTAL IS ONLY COMPETITOR

Head of Postal Declares His Company If Not Merged With Western Union.

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—Clarence H. Mackay, in his testimony today before the committee of the legislature of New York appointed to examine the question of whether telegraph and telephone companies should be placed under the public service law, stated that by reason of the competition given by the Postal Telegraph company, telegraph rates have been reduced from 20 to 50 per cent. He also stated that the postal company was the only company that had ever succeeded in competing with the Western Union, and that if the Postal company should combine with the Bell Telephone company and the Western Union, there would never be any competition, on account of it being impossible to obtain entrance into large commercial centers and to obtain rights of way on highways between great cities, such as New York and Philadelphia, and also on account of the vast sum of money that would be required.
