## LIBERAL OFFERING IN PORTLAND MARKET

Prices Have Been Good—Light Calves Have Ben in Grate Demand.

PORTLAND, Or., Jan. 24.—There has been a fair run of cattle at the yards the past week, 2057 head being received. The demand for heavy stuff has taken off everything that has been received.

The hog supply has been proportionately liberal, but buyers have taken the offerings promptly at good prices, 1244 head were received and several loads brought the top price of \$2.55, but the bulk of the sales have been running from \$2 to \$2.10.

## NELSON NOW CERTAIN HE WILL BEST WOLGAST

Easily Puts Eddie Lang of Chicago Out—Takes Blow After Blow on Jaw Without Injury.

MEMPHIS, Jan. 24.—"I proved to my own satisfaction that I still have my punch and my eye, from now until February 22 my energies will be bent on conditioning myself for a real fight with Wolgast," was Battling Nelson's comment today upon his mill with Eddie Lang of Chicago.

Lang landed the eighth round in his battle with the champion last night before the Memphis Athletic club. The impression was general among the spectators, however, that Nelson played with his opponent for the first four rounds and did not try to put him out.

At periods Nelson bored in, leaving himself uncovered, and laughed when the Chicago lad landed punches after punches on his jaw.

In the seventh round Nelson opened up and had Lang in distress from ripping body blows before the song.

The eighth spelled defeat for Lang. After belaboring Lang's midriff with a succession of lefts and rights, Nelson sent a crushing blow to the kidneys and Lang fell like a log. His seconds foisted the sponge before he was counted out.

Nelson stated that he would engage in no more fights before his battle with Wolgast next month. His active training, he said, will commence within two weeks.

## SAYS TERM "BARBAROUS MEXICO" IS MILD ONE

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 24.—L. Guiterrez de Lara, a political refugee who was held by the federal authorities at Los Angeles on complaint of the Mexican government, charged with promoting resistance to the rule of President Diaz, declared in a public address in Elks' temple here that slavery actually prevails on the plantations in Mexico and that the term, "Barbarous Mexico," is mild to one who fully understands the situation, adding: "Americans are not being persecuted in Mexico."

## GRANTS PASS AIDS LOCAL FRUIT MEN

Union of That City Votes \$50 Toward Expenses of C. E. Whisler in Fighting La Fean Bill.

GRANTS PASS, Or., Jan. 24.—At the regular monthly meeting of the Rogue River Fruit exchange in Grants Pass G. A. Hoyer, president of the Medford Fruitgrowers' union, spoke of the efforts that were being made in Washington in behalf of the Rogue River valley. The latest report was to the effect that the bill would not pass in its present shape, as some strong men in congress have become convinced of the unfairness of the measure.

J. F. Burke and J. T. Pritchard were appointed a committee to raise \$50 as the exchange's share of the expense of sending Mr. Whisler to Washington in the interest of an equitable fruit package bill.

W. M. Hair gave a report of the action taken at Medford in the interest of forming a union, which is to comprise the whole Rogue River valley. H. T. Pritchard, W. M. Hair and H. Wood were appointed a committee to audit the books and report at the next meeting. R. Thomas, W. W. Canby and W. M. Hair were appointed a committee to revise the bylaws and they were instructed to report at the February meeting. H. L. Andrews was appointed chairman of a committee which he was to select to suggest suitable nominees for directors to be elected next year.
