

LOOKS LIKE UTAH FOR BIG BATTLE

Rickard Says He Will Forfeit Entire Sum He Posted Before He Lets It Go.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 28.—Utah will get the Jeffries-Johnson fight or "Tex" Rickard will forfeit the entire purse of \$101,000 is the latest word from the Nevada promoter in a telegram received here today.

Rickard declares that he already has agreed with Jeffries and Berger at Ogden to post the entire purse with "Big" Tim Sullivan of New York as stakeholder. Jeffries and Johnson are to divide the money if the authorities of Utah interfere with or stop the fight.

The Telegram. The telegram reads as follows: "Contract signed between myself, Berger and Jeffries in Ogden January 24 by which I am to post the entire purse with Timothy D. Sullivan of New York. In case the authorities interfere the purse is to be divided equally between Jeffries and Johnson. There is no possibility of the contest being declared off through any interference of Gleason.

"I think the story that the fight has been declared off in Utah must have emanated from the San Francisco society of the knockers of the sport."

Gleason Counts on Jeffries. SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 28.—"It looks like press agents' work," is the comment of Jack Gleason today on Rickard's telegram that the fight will be held near Salt Lake.

"I don't believe that Jeffries signed any agreement with Rickard in Ogden," declared Gleason. "I have Jeffries' word that he will stick by me and I trust him.

"I will leave for Seattle on Sunday evening. Jeffries is due there on Tuesday, and I will meet him upon my arrival. Then the matter will be definitely settled one way or another. It has gone far enough, and I am going to see that the big fellow declares himself.

"I repeat that the fight will take place in San Francisco. These Salt Lake and Ely reports do not bother me in the least, because I know where I stand."

YAKIMA SOON TO HAVE 10,000,000 APPLE TREES

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 28.—Ten million young apple trees will be growing in the Yakima valley, west of Spokane, the coming season, according to A. W. McDonald, president of the Washington Nursery company of Tappan, Wash. He predicts that within a few years Washington will lead the world in the nursery business. The Washington Nursery company will, within a few days, start between 60 and 70 men at work grafting trees. The work will continue 50 days, during which time they expect to graft 5,000,000 trees. Mr. McDonald was one of the nurserymen influential in having the new state horticultural law amended to provide for inspection of nursery stock by the state before it is shipped from the nursery.

SIX DARING SPIRITS OFF TO SCALE M'KINLEY

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 28.—Heading a party of six daring spirits, Tom Lloyd of Fairbanks, Alaska, is journeying toward Mount McKinley today and before July 4 confidently expects some one of his men to plant the Stars and Stripes on the forbidding summit of Mount McKinley.

Lloyd's primary object is to prove that the highest peak in North America can be conquered. In addition to this, he is being backed to the extent of a \$5000 wager that the trip will be successful. W. H. McPhee and Dave Petree of Fairbanks furnished the money for the bet; its taker was not named.

In the party besides Lloyd are Robert Horn, W. R. Taylor, Charles McGonigle, C. E. Davidson and William Lloyd. According to advices received from Fairbanks today, the six men started on their journey December 27.

WOULD REGULATE FOOD STORAGE

New York Makes Move for New Laws Making it Illegal to Store Food for Longer Period Than Twenty Days.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Jan. 28.—Petitions urging upon the state legislature the need of laws to regulate the storage of food are being circulated here today.

The documents declare that food storage is the immediate cause of present high cost of living. They demand a law making it illegal to hold food in storage more than 30 days.

The Buffalo United Trades Council voted a scathing condemnation of storage methods. It declared that the present general meat boycott did not affect the packers because they merely would store their product until meat was a necessity.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 28.—Increase of foreign food imports and decrease of home production is shown today in a bulletin issued by the department of commerce and labor. The report shows that in 1909 the United States imported \$30,000,000 worth of crude stuffs more than it did the year before. It also shows that in 1909 the country's exports in crude foodstuffs were \$53,000,000 less than the preceding year. The bulletin shows that the supply of beef for local consumption has been added to the value of \$1,000,000 by the increased importation and to the value of \$8,000,000 by the increased exportation.
