PLAN BIG RACING CLUB IN NORTHWEST

Would Have One Similar to National Trotting Association of the Eastern States.

PORTLAND, Or., Feb. 3.—(Special.)—Preliminary steps were taken here this week for the formation of a Western Fair association for the country west of the Rocky mountains, to bear the same relation to this territory as the American Trotting association and the National Trotting association do to the east. The step was taken at the meeting of the North Pacific Fair association, which appointed a committee to work on the project and report at the next meeting.

New officers of the North Pacific Fair association were elected as follows: President, F. A. Welch, Salem; vice-president, W. H. Gibbons, Boise, Idaho; secretary and treasurer, J. W. Pace, North Yakima, Wash.

Dates set for the various racing meets of the northwest during the coming season are as follows: Everett, August 29-September 3; Portland, September 5-10; Salem, September 12-17; Walla Walla, September 19-24; North Yakima, September 26-October 1; Spokane, October 10-15.

Statewide interest is shown in the development congress to be held at Eugene, February 11 and 12. Commonwealth day, the 51st anniversary of the admission of Oregon as a state, will be celebrated on February 12. Questions of general interest, such as the conservation of the state's resources, extension of irrigation, country conditions, and educational subjects will be taken up.

Japan, showing its friendly feeling toward Oregon and the Pacific coast, has sent 170 bushes of native roses to be set out in the parks and public squares of Portland on February 22, the official rose-planting day, when the metropolis will make a holiday and hold special exercises. The gift is a gracious one and is much appreciated by rose festival officials. A number of foreign nations have been heard from, each contributing native roses to be planted here on Washington's birthday. It is expected by rosarians that the bushes will thrive in their adopted country as well as in their own clime.

An instance of the advance of reality values in Portland during the past 50 years was brought up this week when the corner at Fifth and Morrison streets was sold for \$405,000, and an additional \$110,000 was paid for the transfer of the leases. Peter W. Severson, who sold the property, owned it for 51 years. It was literally forced upon him as apparently of little value. He was then owed a week's wages by the owner of the property, who also borrowed Severson's shotgun and lost it. The man who held the lot offered the property in lieu of the week's wages and the missing weapon. Severson demurred, but finally was forced to accept the lot to cover the double debt.

GRANTS PASS FOLKS WORRIED BY DELAY

No Work Being Done on Ament Dam Owing to Litigation and Citizens Worry Over Irrigation.

GRANTS PASS, Or., Feb. 3.—It will be remembered that at the last term of court the case of William Zimmerman et al. vs The Golden Drift Mining company came up before Judge Hanna, at which time four demurrers were argued. Practically two days were taken up in the argument of the four demurrers which were argued all at once, A. E. Reames representing the plaintiffs and A. C. Hough and H. D. Norton the defendants. The demurrers were to set aside the present receiver, G. H. Saunders, on the ground that the court here had no jurisdiction, as the Golden Drift was an Arizona corporation, that the bond of the receiver be increased and that a local man be appointed as receiver. The substance of the demurrers was published in this paper some weeks ago, at the time they were filed.

As stated, the demurrers were argued at the January term of court and Judge Hanna took the same under advisement and before leaving the bench he overruled the demurrer. What the next move will be in the game is hard to tell, but it is likely that at the coming adjourned session which will convene on February 14 with Judge Calkins presiding, that further petitions will be filed, but of what nature they will be is not yet known. There is no work being done on the dam at the present time, and many in this city are somewhat worried about the condition it is in, some believing that if high water comes this spring that considerable damage will be done to the dam and pumping plant. The present receiver is not in a position to go on with repairs until his right in the matter is firmly established, but since Judge Hanna has overruled the demurrers it is possible that he will again put a force of men to work at the Golden Drift.

LOVETT TO IMPROVE SERVICE ON COAST

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 3.—After a trip to New York to confer with Judge Robert S. Lovett, president of the Southern Pacific railroad, William F. Herrin, chief counsel for the road on the Pacific coast, is in San Francisco again.

Herrin's return has been anxiously awaited by persons particularly interested in the situation surrounding the Republican gubernatorial nomination. Today, however, he refused unqualifiedly to discuss political matters.

According to Herrin, President Lovett intends to improve the service of the Southern and Union Pacific roads on the Pacific coast and make extensions for the development of new territory.
