**FRUITGROWERS MEET.**

On motion the chair was empowered to appoint a committee of five to confer with the county court at a special meeting to be held next Saturday, at which time the matter of appointing special inspectors will be taken up. The following committee was appointed: G. A. Hoyer, Charles Meserve, C. W. Potter, J. A. Perry, A. C. Allen.

A resolution was introduced by Mr. Hoyer that the county court be requested not to appoint any inspectors without the indorsement of the society. Mr. Miller of Central Point said the resolution was arrogating something to the society it had no right to. Mr. Cowles thought the same way, and evidently a majority were of the same opinion, for the resolution was lost.

C. E. Whisler then appeared to make his report of his trip to Denver, Washington and other points east. Mr. Whisler began by stating that he had returned to the society \$50 of the expense money advanced him, and then began his account of the trip.

"My first visit," said Mr. Whisler, "was to the weather bureau. There, Mr. Moore, the chief, told me frankly that there would be nothing doing in the weather bureau line for two years; that a spirit of retrenchment was in vogue and that it was as much as his job was worth for him to ask for more. On being assured, however, that this request was not being made for advertising purposes, but from a commercial point of view, and that the Rogue River valley needed it, he promised that he would arrange matters so that the people of this valley would receive the needed weather information during the critical times of the year for this year, and held out the hope that Medford would have a weather station among the first of the new ones.

"At the bureau of soil survey I was more successful and was practically promised a survey of the valley soon.

"One year more is all you can hope to retain Professor O'Gara. I want to say to you that there is a demand for that man's services in more directions than one. He is wanted in California, in Washington and in the department. His reputation with the bureau officials seemed to think the Rogue River valley had a lot of nerve to ask for more than his services."

Mr. Whisler's further remarks covered the ground of his former interview in the Mail Tribune, published the day after his return from the east. Detailing how he had convinced the convention of the National League of Commission Merchants that the eastern box contained a bushel, and also made Secretary Wilson sit up and take notice.

"The fight for the La Fean bill by the jobbers," said Mr. Whisler, "is of greater magnitude than you imagine. The bill is now in the committee and has received some pretty hard blows, but it is not dead, and don't get the idea into your head that it is anywhere nearly so. After my showing Secretary Wilson that our box held a bushel, I am inclined to think it would be rather difficult to get a bill like the La Fean bill by Secretary Wilson."

J. A. Westerlund brought up the question of the use of the Sutherland Land company of Douglas county in using Rogue River views for advertising purposes, and Messrs. Westerlund, Whisler and Cowles were appointed a committee to look into the matter.
