

### STATE BANKING LAWS COMPILED

Monetary Commission Files Interesting Report on Different Banking Laws Throughout United States.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 8.—The banking laws of all the states and territories of this country have been summarized and compared in a remarkably clear and useful digest, issued today under the auspices of the national monetary commission as another output of its exhaustive investigation of banking and financial operations and conditions in this and other countries.

It has not been attempted to present anything but the substance of the statutes, for the reason that a digest dealing with their application or interpretation would involve great labor and fill an amount of space greater than the commission thought proper to give to the subject.

The statutes are systematized as far as possible under the head of each state by division into three general captions—banks, savings banks and trust companies—but in some cases material which applies to one or more classes is presented under one head.
