### MEAT TRUST NOT ALONE TO BLAME

Bureau of Statistics Show That Livestock Receipts at Seven Leading Markets Are Lower.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 10.—Figures which may show that the "meat trust" may not alone be responsible for the present high cost of living were issued today by the bureau of statistics.

The special statement which contained the figures declared that the livestock receipts at seven leading markets in the interior of the country for 1909 were considerably lower than for any year during the last five years.

Livestock receipts at four principal Atlantic seaboard markets were less than for 1907 and 1908. The decrease was particularly noticeable in hogs.

At fifteen large interior markets grain receipts were lower than during any year since 1904. A heavy decline in grain and its products, compared to the receipts of the last two years, was noted in grain and flour at principal Atlantic ports.

The figures contained in the statement will be presented to the committee of the senate, appointed in accordance with the Elkins-Lodge resolution.

McGrath believes that if Dorando will make the match one of the greatest Marathons in the history of the sport will be pulled off. He will stage his attraction at the Recreation baseball park.

BARTLESVILLE, Okla., Feb. 10.—That he buried an axe in the head of his sleeping father, T. H. Brown, and then stood by and watched his victim quiver until death came, was the startling testimony of Peter Brown, whose trial for the alleged murder of his father, is going on in court here today.

Brown further declared that his deed was prompted by his stepmother with whom he believed himself to be in love.

"She tempted me so much," he said, "that I thought I loved her and I killed my father when she ordered me to do it."

"She aroused me at midnight," he continued, "and told me that the time had come to kill father. I went to the lounge where he was sleeping and buried the axe in his head."

### BIG FAIR IS PLANNED IN PORTLAND SOON

All Oregon Will Be Asked to Co-operate With Portland in Holding Big Industrial Fair.

PORTLAND, Or., Feb. 10.—A big industrial fair, representative of all Oregon, is being planned for Portland this fall. As yet plans are tentative, but it is practically certain that the exposition will be held and that it will be a big success as assured from the interests that are behind the movement.

It is expected to hold the fair during the first ten days of September. Manufactures of the state will be given a prominent place in the displays and the co-operation of the Portland Manufacturers' association, a strong organization that has done a great deal to build up manufacturing of all kinds, is probable. The varied products and resources of Oregon will be shown, and it is believed the exposition will demonstrate the progress Oregon is making in a striking way.

Banquet to Williams.  
An event that is of wide interest is a complimentary banquet to be given Judge George H. Williams, Oregon's grand old man, on his 37th birthday, March 27, in Portland. As attorney general in President Grant's cabinet and prominent in the nation's history throughout his active life, Judge Williams commands the affection and respect of all Oregonians and the most prominent people of the city are proud to show him honor.

Planning to increase the falling lobster supply, the United States fisheries department will transplant a carload in the waters of Yaquina bay. Whether the lobsters will thrive there is not yet known, but it is thought conditions are right for them. Lobsters demand a rocky bottom, without silt deposited by nearby rivers, which is the case at Yaquina. This is the reason assigned for the failure of experiments made heretofore in trying to grow eastern lobsters in Pacific waters. Senator Bourne has been agitating the matter and has secured the promise of Fish Commissioner Bowers to make the experiment at Yaquina.

It is expected that over 2000 delegates will attend the annual state convention of the Young People's Christian Endeavor society in Portland February 15-17, which is likely to be the biggest assembly of the organization ever held in Oregon. The sessions will be held at the First Presbyterian church, Twelfth and Alder streets. While in the city the Endeavorers will be entertained by a reception and banquet by the Y. M. C. A.

Oregon roses are to have a wider fame than ever very soon, for the beautiful blooms that have made a reputation for Portland as a rose center are to be copied by Paul de Longpre, the celebrated painter of roses. The well known artist planned to come here on February 22 at the time of the annual rose planting, but was unable to carry out his intention and will come during the rose festival in June. He will paint some of the famous flowers he will see here.

### FIREMEN BRAVE RUBBER FUMES

San Francisco Company Has Hard Battle Against Burning Rubber to Overcome the Flames.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 10.—Scores of firemen today are suffering from the effects of inhaling fumes of burning rubber in a fire which late last night destroyed the vulcanizing department of the First Rubber company.

The flames were not discovered until the interior of the vulcanizing plant was ablaze. When the fire department arrived volumes of dense smoke caused by burning rubber impeded the work of the fire fighters. Fireman after fireman dashed into the shop only to be overcome and rescued by their fellows. Men at the nozzles of the heavy hose remained at their posts until they dropped, while the water from the hose served but to increase the volume and density of the smoke.

#### Wilson Warns Cannery.

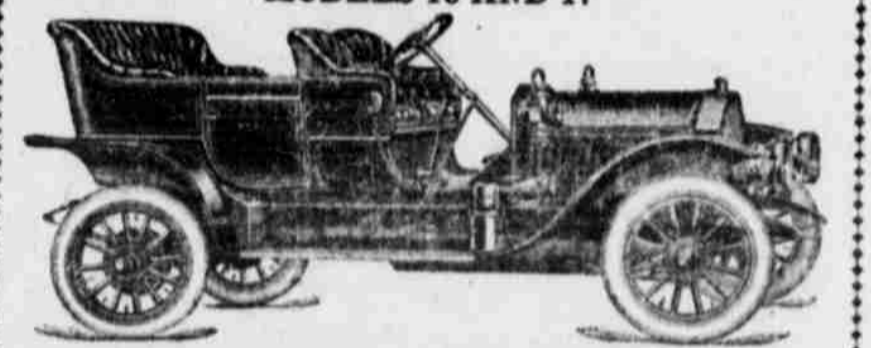

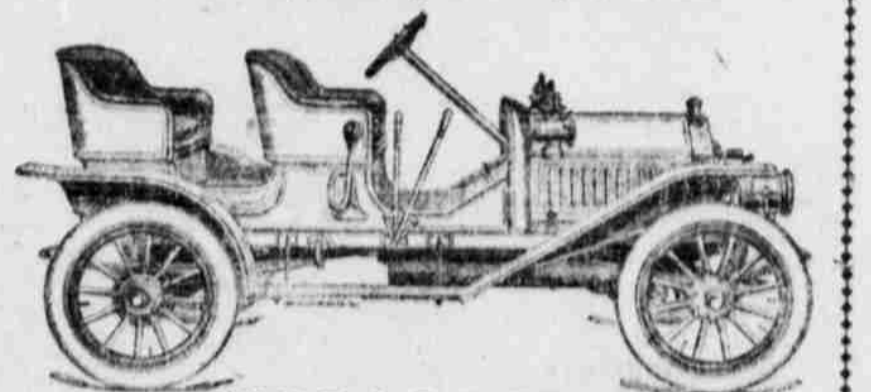


MODEL 16, \$1900 F. O. B. PORTLAND.
