serve some different form of amusement.

The builders will also incorporate in the building a hall, which will seat 2000 people and be in the nature of the Armory in Portland. There will be two galleries—one for the plunge and one so constructed that it will permit of an athletic club laying out a track and holding indoor athletic meets. During the winter the plunge will be floored over and a place arranged for dancing. In fact, nothing has been overlooked by the builders, who, confident of Medford's growth, are building for the future, when Medford shall have her destined 25,000.

The concern will have their own laundry, heating and electric light plants in connection, and the grounds will be brilliantly lighted.

The grounds will be parked and made most beautiful. It is proposed to build a small lake and arrange fountains at various points. In fact, nothing is to be overlooked in making it an amusement park in every sense of the word.

A bandstand is to be erected and if suitable arrangements can be made with the Medford band, concerts will

be given on Sundays and other occasions.

It is the plan of the company to dispose of a few lots 25x100 on Riverside avenue to persons who care to put in cigar stores, confectionery and the like. With the completion of such an amusement park these locations would seem to be most desirable.

**Incorporate for \$50,000.**

The company has been incorporated with a capital stock of \$50,000, all of which has been subscribed and is fully paid up. It will be known as the Medford Natatorium & Amusement company. The men who are interested are F. E. Merrick, H. C. Kentner, J. E. Enyart, J. S. Orth and W. H. Brown.

The building of such an amusement park means much to Medford. In the past one complaint that has been made regarding the city is that there "is nothing to do." With this place in operation those in search of amusement can wander care free and happy through a labyrinth of pleasures and truly enjoy themselves. That it is the largest in the state outside of Portland is simply another manifestation of the Medford enterprise and spirit.
