**USED DYNAMITE TO SLAY BABE?**

**Head of Santa Rosa Sanitarium Accused of Attempting to Kill Mother and Child.**

SANTA ROSA, Cal., Feb. 14.—District Attorney Lea and Sheriff Smith were busily engaged today on secret investigations concerning the evidence which they are collecting to present in an effort to substantiate the charge of attempting to kill Luella Smith and her baby with dynamite, lodged yesterday against Dr. Willard P. Burke, head of the Burke sanitarium.

"There are certain phases of the case which it is impossible for us to make plain at the present time," declared Assistant Attorney Heil today.

"We have been pursuing investigations along certain lines which demanded the utmost secrecy. For this reason Mr. Lea has been forced to conceal his movements to a certain extent."

Dr. Burke, who is out on bail under a bond of \$20,000, conferred with his counsel today and went about his business at the sanitarium in a calm manner. He declared that he had no fear whatever as to the outcome of the case, but said that upon advice of his attorneys he was unable to discuss it in any manner. The officials stated today that they were not at present looking for any dynamite at the sanitarium, as the investigation conducted yesterday under the search warrant which was served at the institution had satisfied them that none would be found there.

**DANCING ROLAND.**  
A Scotch Shepherd's Remedy For All Kinds of Maladies.

A highland shepherd, one Donald McAlpin, a famous dancer, was reputed to have cured his mistress of a mysterious malady by means of dancing a reel with her, and this story being nosed abroad gained him the reputation of being a successful physician.

His humble cottage in Stockmulek, overlooking Strathpey, was besieged with crowds of patients who hoped to get rid of their ailments by a dance with Donald. The shepherd did not hesitate to take advantage of this stroke of good luck and soon had a large and thriving practice.

The treatment adopted was very simple, the main features being as follows: In cases of indigestion moderate doses of medicated "aqua" were taken, followed by the ceum shall, or promenade step. For catarrh Donald prescribed in order to produce perspiration a large dose of gruel mixed with honey and butter, followed by ceum crask, or highland fling. All the different processes terminated in the patient being well wrapped up in warm blankets, and the doses of medicine and dancing were repeated, according to the patient's constitution and the nature of his disease.—British Medical Journal.
