OFFICER REFUSES TO DISCUSS EXPLOSION

VALLEJO, Cal., Feb. 17.—Naval Constructor Evans, who returned here last night with his bride from the east, refused today to discuss the explosion of the boiler tube on the torpedo boat destroyer Hopkins at San Diego yesterday, although the tubes of the boat's boilers were found to have been stuffed with rubbish when it was under repairs at the navy yard here.

"I cannot tell whether the explosion might have had any connection with the incident here until I learn which boiler exploded," said Evans. "Only one boiler was affected by the affair to which you refer."

The stuffing of the tubes of the Hopkins was "the talk of the yard" today, and there were many who expressed the likelihood that the investigation would develop a sensation.

Rear Admiral Phelps, in charge of Mare Island, said that the investigation would be held at San Diego, where the explosion occurred, and refused to discuss it in any way.

The general opinion prevails that the stuffing of the tubes could not have been inspired by any known purpose other than the possibility of a desire for vengeance growing out of the factional difficulties at the yard.

SHORTER LINE PLANNED ANGEL CITY TO EAST

New Company Will Cut 250 Miles Off of Present Route East From Los Angeles.

DENVER, Colo., Feb. 17.—Several hundred miles of trackage will be cut from the present railway route between here and Los Angeles, according to representatives of the Arizona Eastern Railroad company, who are here today.

The Arizona company was incorporated last week with a capital of \$4,000,000. Although it will have for its main object the building of a line from Yuma to Durango, where it will connect with the Denver & Rio Grande, the company will ultimately use the new route as a part of a transcontinental road through Arizona.

This would furnish Los Angeles with the shortest eastern route through Denver and Omaha to Chicago. It would save at least 150 and possibly 250 miles over the present shortest route.

Bill Up Soon

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 17.—The exclusion bill, introduced in the house of representatives by Hayes of California will soon come up for action. One clause of this measure reads:

"To exclude persons who, under the provisions of the revised statutes of the United States, are ineligible to become citizens of the United States unless they are merchants, teachers, students or travelers for curiosity or pleasure."
