

PHYSICIANS HOPEFUL TILLMAN'S RECOVERY

Patient's Power of Articulation is Completely Suspended and It is Feared He Will Never Speak.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—Dr. Tickford, attending Senator Ben Tillman, issued the following bulletin this afternoon:

"The senator is resting comfortably. He is suffering from paralysis and aphasia. His temperature is unchanged from the morning record and his pulse and respiration are normal.

"The progress is favorable to Tillman's recovery if the present conditions are maintained for a few days." The stricken senator had a fairly restful night, broken only at intervals by bad spells.

The patient was able to recognize the members of his family, and although he was unable to speak, he gave slight signs of recognition with his eyes.

The senator's power of articulation is completely suspended, and it is feared that he never will speak again.

HUNDREDS SUE FOR MRS. RUSSELL SAGE'S FAVOR

PASADENA, Cal., Feb. 19.—Hundreds of letters begging for financial assistance have begun pouring into Pasadena addressed to Mrs. Russell Sage, the widow of the late New York financier, who arrived here a few days ago for "rest."

The mailman delivered a great package of communications today to add to the pile which Major Slocum, her nephew, estimated to total over 500. Most of the epistles have not been opened. Thus far only two of them have been given to Mrs. Sage to peruse. The remainder probably will not be read for some time. Speaking of the flood of communications asking for aid, Major Slocum said:

"Mrs. Sage is in no sense in public life. This continuous string of letters asking for money is annoying her. She will not pretend to give them heed."

Mrs. Sage and her party are at the Raymond cottage. She expects to remain here two months before returning to the east.

PRICKS THUMB WITH A PIN; POISONED; DEAD

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 19.—Mrs. Martha Freeland, mother of City Treasurer Ray Freeland, is dead here today, a victim of blood poisoning. A month ago Mrs. Freeland pricked her thumb with a pin. She paid little attention to the wound at the time, but it finally became so serious that she was taken to the Fannie Paddock hospital. The physicians, however, were unable to do anything for her and she succumbed yesterday.

KING GEORGE CALLS IN ALL DIPLOMATS

Every Representative of Greece to Foreign Countries is Recalled, Owing to Strife at Home.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 19.—King George of Greece today signed a decree recalling all Greek diplomatic representatives in foreign posts with the exception of this city and Washington.

This move is taken to mean that the military league, which is at daggers' points with the navy, is well entrenched in the king's good graces in its fight for control of Grecian domestic affairs.

It was reported today that the Greek fleet has mutinied as the result of the issuing of a command by the military league that all the ships be disarmed. The vessels, the report stated, steamed out to sea to prevent the execution of the order. Communication with Athens, however, was interrupted this afternoon and a verification of the report was impossible.
