LIVE STOCK RECEIPTS LIBERAL IN PORTLAND

Prices Remain Good for Farmers—
Cattle Offering is Most
Gratifying.

PORTLAND, Or., Feb. 21.—Receipts of livestock for the past week have been 1246 cattle, 102 calves, 1351 sheep, 584 hogs, 163 horses. The market for cattle has held a high plane throughout the week, good steers bringing \$5.75 as a top. There has not been an over-supply and buyers have not been able to secure a sufficient number for their requirements. Shippers have been holding back, due to poor advice from market guessers. The supply of sheep has been very light and prices have ruled strong and high for all classes.

The hog supply has been very light and prices have ruled strong and high. Anything like good hogs have brought \$9.25. The sale of hogs at \$9.20 at eastern points was the cause of a good deal of excitement in livestock circles, but such prices do not create any comment at the Portland market. Packers and butchers find themselves rather at a loss in this part of the country just now, as the prices of hogs locally and east are so high that the sale of pork is almost out of the question.

Notice to owners of city lots on which trees and shrubs are growing. In accordance with the state horticultural laws and the regulations of the state board of horticulture, you are hereby notified to spray all shrubs, fruit trees and other varieties of trees that may be infested with San Jose scale or other insect or fungus pests. The spray to be used is the commercial lime-sulphur at the rate of one gallon to eight of water, and applied by means of a spray pump. A mere sprinkling will not be effective and does not conform with the letter of the law.
Those desiring to have the work done for them may enquire at the office of B. F. Clark, or call him up at Main 3295, or address him, P. O. Box 484, city. Mr. Jos. Derry is also prepared to spray on short notice and a letter addressed to him will receive prompt attention.
Do not fail to spray your trees, since spraying is a preventive, as well as a cure.
