SNOW BLOCKS ALL NORTHERN ROADS

Not a Train Will Pass Over West End Missoula Division Before Tomorrow, Owing to the Storm.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 25.—Not a train will pass over the west end of the Missoula division of the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound railway before late tonight or tomorrow. Almost the entire line from Hagan to Avery is blocked with a solid mass of snow, a distance of 60 miles. Avalanches continued to thunder down the mountainsides today.

Charles Nelson was struck by an avalanche near Adair, Mont., on the Bitter-root division and buried under 300 feet of snow. A few hours later another slide at Adair killed two men named Hoes and the wife of one of the men.

Among the trains stalled in the mountains is the fast train loaded with raw silk which the Milwaukee expected to make a record run to New York. Only one overland train reached Seattle yesterday, the North Coast Limited, on the Northern Pacific, breaking through a blockade after being stalled 26 hours and arriving here at 10:30 p. m.

The Northern Pacific line is almost clear this morning and the Great Northern will be before night, the rains and snows having stopped.
