## OFFERS CLUB NEW PUBLICITY CHANCE

National Apple Show Plans to Take Exhibits This Year East—Local Club Given Chance to Buy Space for Exhibit.

The following communication from the National Apple show at Spokane has been received by the Commercial club and referred to the exhibit committee:

Spokane, Wash., Feb. 25.—Medford Commercial club: So many suggestions that an exhibition from the National Apple Show would be of great advertising value to all parts of the northwest if taken to Chicago have been received that the trustees of the National Apple show sent a committee east to investigate conditions, ascertain what support could be expected from the railways, and what the probable expense of such an undertaking would be.

The committee made a thorough investigation and received such promises of financial assistance from the railway companies that we are submitting to the fruit districts a proposition which we trust will meet with your approval.

We hold the third National Apple show in Spokane next fall about the same time as last year. At the close of the show we purpose to ship the prize winners to Chicago, where we can give an eight-day exhibition in the First Regiment armory, a building large enough to accommodate great crowds of people at all times.

The exhibition will require about ten carloads of apples. We expect to send five or six straight carload prize winners, also all winners in the ten-box, five-box, single box and special contests. These will be transported to Chicago and placed on exhibition free of cost to the grower.

The railway companies have promised to provide us with a special fruit train, to be run through on passenger schedule time, reaching Chicago in 70 hours after leaving Spokane. This will make it possible to hold the show in the east within seven days after closing in Spokane, allowing two days at each end of the line for packing, cartage and installation.

Band Along Also. If the plan is carried out, we will provide a band of national reputation, also engage solo performers and singers, giving the very best concerts as an additional attraction in Chicago. We would spend about \$10,000 on special advertising and exploitation. Other expenses would be: Building, decorating, lights, etc., \$3000; installation, \$2500; band and features, \$3500; office expense, \$2500; transportation, \$4400; cartage and organization trip, license, insurance, etc., \$5000, making a total estimated expense of \$36,300.

To meet this expense, we are reasonably sure of the \$13,000 in subscriptions from the railway and orchard land companies; concession space should net \$1000; ticket sales are estimated at \$12,000, leaving about \$6000 necessary to guarantee the project.

District Displays. Our plan is to provide exhibition space for district displays along three sides of the building, making a series of booths similar to those at the National Apple show at Spokane. There is a total of 8000 square feet of space available for this purpose.

To give each district a fair chance, we are forced to limit the size of the district displays. All booths will be 12 feet in depth and a district must contract for either 10, 20 or 30 feet frontage. A space 10x12 would cost you in rental, \$150; a space 20x12 costs \$300, and 30x12 costs \$450. We will provide transportation on your exhibit to Chicago and will erect a framework for your booth.

## ARKANSAS TO AID OF OREGON

Delegation From Southern State Will Oppose La Fean Bill to Bitter End—Peter Deish Writes to Clarence Reames.

Clarence Reames has received from Peter Deish, formerly of Jacksonville, Nev. of Helena, Arkansas, an announcement that the Arkansas delegation will vote against the La Fean bill. Mr. Deish encloses the following letter from Congressman R. B. Macon:

Washington, D. C., Feb. 12, 1910. Mr. Peter Deish.

"Helena, Arkansas. My Dear Deish: I am just in receipt of your favor asking me to oppose the La Fean bill limiting and fixing the size of apple boxes, in which you give splendid reasons for the position you take, and I hasten to reply to say that it will give me pleasure to oppose it to the bitter end. I think the people who raise apples ought to be permitted to ship them in any kind of boxes that they can handle to the best advantage. It makes no difference whether they contain one apple or a thousand. This thing of trying to put the government in control of all the enterprising of the country is becoming alarming and I for one will resist the tendency to do so as long as I have a voice to oppose it. You can assure your Oregon friends that I am with them to a finish against the bill you complain of. R. B. MACON."
