WILL BEGIN SOON ON OREGON AUTO MAP

Engineers Who Will Perform Work Arrive in Portland from California and Are Ready to Begin Work.

G. F. Beck, with his staff of road-mapping engineers, has reached Portland from California, and will commence work immediately on all of the important highways of the state for the Automobile club. Mr. Beck's work is the most important undertaking yet inaugurated in Oregon to advertise the scenic charms and attract to the state the growing throng of tourists who would see America in all its wonderful grandeur. All of the local automobile owners expect great results from the proposed mapping. The state association has sent word to Chairman W. J. Clemens of the road-mapping committee that it will gladly support the work of the Portland association in carrying out the Beck plan. Numerous letters are being received by Mr. Clemens offering support, and suggesting the scope of the work that is now ready to commence.

The preliminary list of roads to be mapped, as framed by the committee is as follows: One route from Portland to the Sandy, two to Mount Hood, one to Willhoit Springs, one to Salem, one from Portland to the southern boundary of the state via Eugene, Roseburg, Grants Pass, Medford and Ashland, one road from Medford to Crater Lake, one from Crater Lake to Klamath, one from Klamath to Lakeview, one road from Lakeview north to The Dalles via Summer Lake, Bend, Prineville and the Deschutes country, one road from Shanks to The Dalles, one from The Dalles to Pendleton via Wasco, Olex and Heppner, one road from Pendleton to Weston, one road from Pendleton to Weston, connecting with the Walla Walla road, one road from Portland to La Grande, Union and Baker City, one from Portland to Forest Grove, two roads from Portland to McMinnville, one from Portland to Tillamook, and one from Tillamook to Nehalem. Other routes will be included in the work of the engineers, every important scenic attraction of the state that can be reached now by highway capable of being traveled by automobiles, being on the list for attention.

In making maps of these roads the engineers go into every useful detail. Distance is made as exact as if a line were put on the highway. Two speedometers are used, one on each front wheel, so that any variation on one will be caught up by the other, and the average will be as accurate as distance can be made. This automobile is sent over the same road twice, to check up, so that in fact the distances given by the engineers is checked by four speedometer readings. Gradometers are also used, giving the exact grade of any section of the road, which varies materially from the level. In the detailed maps worked out by a person following the map and traveling over a highway pursuant to instructions cannot miss his course, even in the dark, as the instructions are so complete that the poorest navigator could cover the state by dead reckoning in the night. All turns, grades, important landmarks, forks, crossings and other instructions are set forth with a detailed map that is drawn accurately to scale.

WHEN FLOUR WAS FIFTY A SACK

An Old Resident Recites a Few Reminiscences of the Days of Old, When Food Was High, But Money Was Plentiful.

"It looks to me," said an old time resident of the Rogue River valley, to a group of interested listeners, "like things were going back in price to the days of the early 50's. I can remember when flour was worth \$9 a sack in Jacksonville, and salt sold for \$16 an ounce. It was almost worth its weight in gold. A plug of Peck Brand tobacco cost \$5.00. Money, or rather gold dust was plentiful in those days and when we wanted anything in those days we bought it, no matter what the price. Every miner carried a buckskin sack with his dust in it and in every store, saloon or other public place, there was a set of gold scales. Many men carried a small pocket set for weighing gold. You bought your goods and then weighed out enough gold to pay for them. In paying for a single drink at the bar the customer was to open the sack and allow the bartender to take out a pinch of dust. If a saloonman's fingers were large he got more than if they were small and slender. As a usual thing they didn't lose in the transaction. But that wasn't what I started to say. What I started to say was that the prices of living are really higher in proportion to the income of the consumer than it was in the days when flour was \$50 a sack. We had the dust then and it was made to spend."
