## GLEASON AND RICKARD TO HOLD ANOTHER SEANCE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 4.—Another "mysterious" conference scheduled for today between Tex Rickard and "local parties" whose names are not to be made public, probably will settle before night the matter as to where the Jeffries-Johnson go will be fought in July, according to Rickard.

Gleason, his partner in the promotion of the big fight, seemed to laugh when told of Rickard's far-reaching plans for a speedy settlement.

"About the only thing I know about such a conference," said Gleason, "is one which Rickard and myself probably will hold today to talk over the bid we already have received."

The letter written by Dick Ferris of Los Angeles has reached here. It was a flat proposition to take over the fight and everything for \$150,000. Neither Rickard nor Gleason will consider it.

## 30 MINERS KILLED IN ALASKA MINE

Bodies Are All Recovered, But There are 12 or 15 Miners Still Entombed—Gross Carelessness Is Charged.

JUNEAU, Alaska, March 4.—The bodies of 30 miners killed in yesterday's explosion in the Treadwell mine are in a temporary morgue on Douglas Island today, six injured are in the hospital and between 12 and 15 are still in the mine, with no hope for rescue.

Twenty-seven men were killed instantly. The other three have died since in the hospital.

Little attempt at rescue work is being made today because of the absolute impossibility of it. Forty boxes of giant powder exploded with terrific force and so completely wrecked the station where the men were working that it will take days to clear away the debris. The men rescued and all the bodies recovered were farther back in the level and were taken through a tunnel into another shaft and thence to the surface.

All of the men are foreigners, a motley crew of Austrians, Servians, Italians, and a sprinkling of Scandinavians. The body of Nels Rustgard, the slope boss, is the only one identified. He leaves a widow and family. Some of the men were literally torn to shreds, while others were practically unscathed except for horrible burns on the face, which makes identification difficult.

## SAYS IMPLICATION ELECTED PRESIDENT

Senator La Follette Scores Dodging of Tariff Revision Plank in Republican Platform.

MADISON, Wis., March 4.—Was Taft elected to the presidency on an "implication"?

This question is asked by Senator La Follette in his weekly paper today. The "implication" referred to was the supposition that the tariff plank in the Republican platform meant that the revision would be downward.

The editorial virtually accuses Taft of attempting to dodge the issue in his Lincoln day speech, when he declared that there was never any specific promise on the part of the Republicans that the tariff would be revised downward.

Taft said: "We did revise the tariff. There was nothing expressly said in the platform that this revision would be downward."

The editorial mentions Taft's further remarks to the effect that the implication was, however, that the revision was to be generally downward.

The editorial then says: "In spite of the lapse of time, we seem to recall the fact that the party-promised matter of a downward revision was not left to stand upon 'implication'."

We seem dimly to remember that President Taft made a speech during his campaign in which he recognized that the situation was acute, and following the precedent of Parker on the gold standard, he made his own platform and amended that of his party by the direct construction of that platform as a meaning of revision downward.

"He did not dare, and his managers did not dare to risk the election upon an equivocation."

## HEAVY ADVANCE IN RAILROAD LOTS

Only One Small Tract Remains Unsold — Purchasers Have Made Money Since S. P. Sold Its Numerous Lots.

All the lots in the city of Medford owned by the Southern Pacific company have been sold save a small fraction on Grape and First, one irregularly shaped lot, which no doubt accounts for its not being sold. Some of the lots purchased eight months ago, when the sale first opened, have been resold several times at a handsome profit, although it was supposed the prices were rather stiff when the lots were placed on the market. An indication of the increase in values, Mrs. J. E. Enyart purchased two in block seven six months ago for \$1150 and sold them yesterday for \$2300, doubling her money. Some of the other purchasers were Alexander Duff, E. C. Aylor, J. W. Berrian, S. V. Davis, G. W. Wentner, J. A. Bell, Oris Crawford, Martin McDonough, Charles Gay, George Porter, G. W. Proper, J. R. Woodford, W. S. Crowell, Mrs. J. E. Enyart, W. F. Shields, W. S. Dewery, Jesse Bell, C. A. Johns. Total value of all the lots was \$33,410. Terms were one-third cash, balance in one and two years at 8 per cent. Six years ago there were all valued at \$3310, one-tenth cash, ten years on balance at 7 per cent. These figures in themselves say a great deal for the marked increase in values in Medford.

## SECRETARY MEYER ON HIS WAY TO COAST

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 4.—On his way to the Pacific coast, Secretary of the Navy George von L. Meyer is speeding across the Colorado desert today.

He occupies the private car Constitution, which is attached to a limited Santa Fe train.

The secretary is accompanied by Mrs. Meyer and his two daughters. They expect to tour the Pacific coast from Los Angeles to Seattle before returning to Washington.

Meyer will inspect the various stations on the coast.
