CALL ISSUED FOR MORE ROOMS

Ed M. Andrews Issues Statement as to Progression of the Work of Committees to Secure More Hotel Accommodations.

E. M. Andrews, chairman of the Commercial club committee in charge of the matter of securing more hotel accommodations, has issued the following statement:

"The ladies of the Greater Medford club, with the assistance of a committee appointed from the Commercial club, have gone into the question of taking care of the overflow of homeseekers who are unable to find accommodations at the hotels and boarding houses. Arrangements have been made for tents and bedding in case the necessity arises for more rooms than can be furnished by private citizens and one or two rooming houses, just about to be opened. The committee feels that with a little immediate assistance from the citizens of Medford in the way of offering rooms that could be spared in case of emergency, will take care of the overflow for the next few days, and by that time they hope to have permanent quarters provided. It is the wish of the committee that anyone having rooms to spare will send their name and address and the number of rooms available to the secretary of the Commercial club, and there will be a person in charge whose business it will be to see that no objectionable people are assigned to any rooms that are tendered by the citizens. The parties sowing the rooms will receive pay for the same at the same rate charged by the regular rooming houses. We hope that the people of Medford will respond at once, as we will only need to use these rooms for a few days, but we are in need of them immediately."

SEATTLE MEN AT SENATE HEARING

Attorney for Ballinger Asks That Subpoenas He Issued for Two Men in Seattle—To Testify in Regard to Letters.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 5.—Attorney Vertrees, representing Ballinger in the congressional investigation into the interior department's affairs, today requested that subpoenas be issued for federal attorney Todd and special agent C. A. Parks of Seattle.

It was intimated that Vertrees hopes to prove by Todd's evidence that the testimony of Todd that the evidence of Louis Glavis and Jones was false in connection with the reason given for not instituting criminal prosecutions in the Alaska coal land cases. Jones' testimony was supplementary to that offered by Glavis previously.

Parks will be called to the stand to testify regarding the letters "found" in Glavis' private box in the federal building at Seattle. The letters in question had been taken from the government files and were in connection with the Cunningham claims.

After Glavis' box had been broken into and the letters discovered, Glavis asserted that they had been placed there to discredit him.

Cummins Amendment Lost.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 5.—The Cummins amendment to the postal savings bank bill was defeated in the senate today by a vote of 40 to 18. The amendment sought to prevent the removal of money from the banks for the purchase of government bonds, except in the event of war.

An amendment offered by Senator Borah, providing that these funds of the banks should not be invested in state bonds or other securities paying less than 21-4 per cent interests was carried.

MEXICAN ROADS TO CONSOLIDATE

Instructions Sent Out That All Solicitation of Business Must Cease—May Have Effect on International Business.

CHICAGO, Ill., March 5.—The amalgamation of the National Railway of Mexico with the Mexican Railway company, Ltd., was foreshadowed today by the withdrawal from active business of the freight and passenger officers of the Mexican Railway company.

Instructions were sent out from Chicago recently to the effect that all solicitation of freight and passenger business should cease. This order is believed to be a preliminary step in a plan for the combination of the roads.

There is considerable speculation here as to the probable effect the proposed combination would have on international business between Mexico and the United States. It is known that the National Railway of Mexico is opposed to a continuance of the present schedule of rates.
