

MEDFORD LIBRARY RECEIVES BOOKS

Library Has Trouble Keeping Pace With the Demand for Good Reading Matter—One Thousand Books Issued—Need More.

The library report for February shows a substantial increase in the number of patrons, 55 having been added for that month. The whole number of patrons is now 1205. The number of books issued was 1000. This would seem as though the library were doing a booming business, but when one considers that the number of books in the library is about 1200, the difficulties to supply the public with good reading is partly realized.

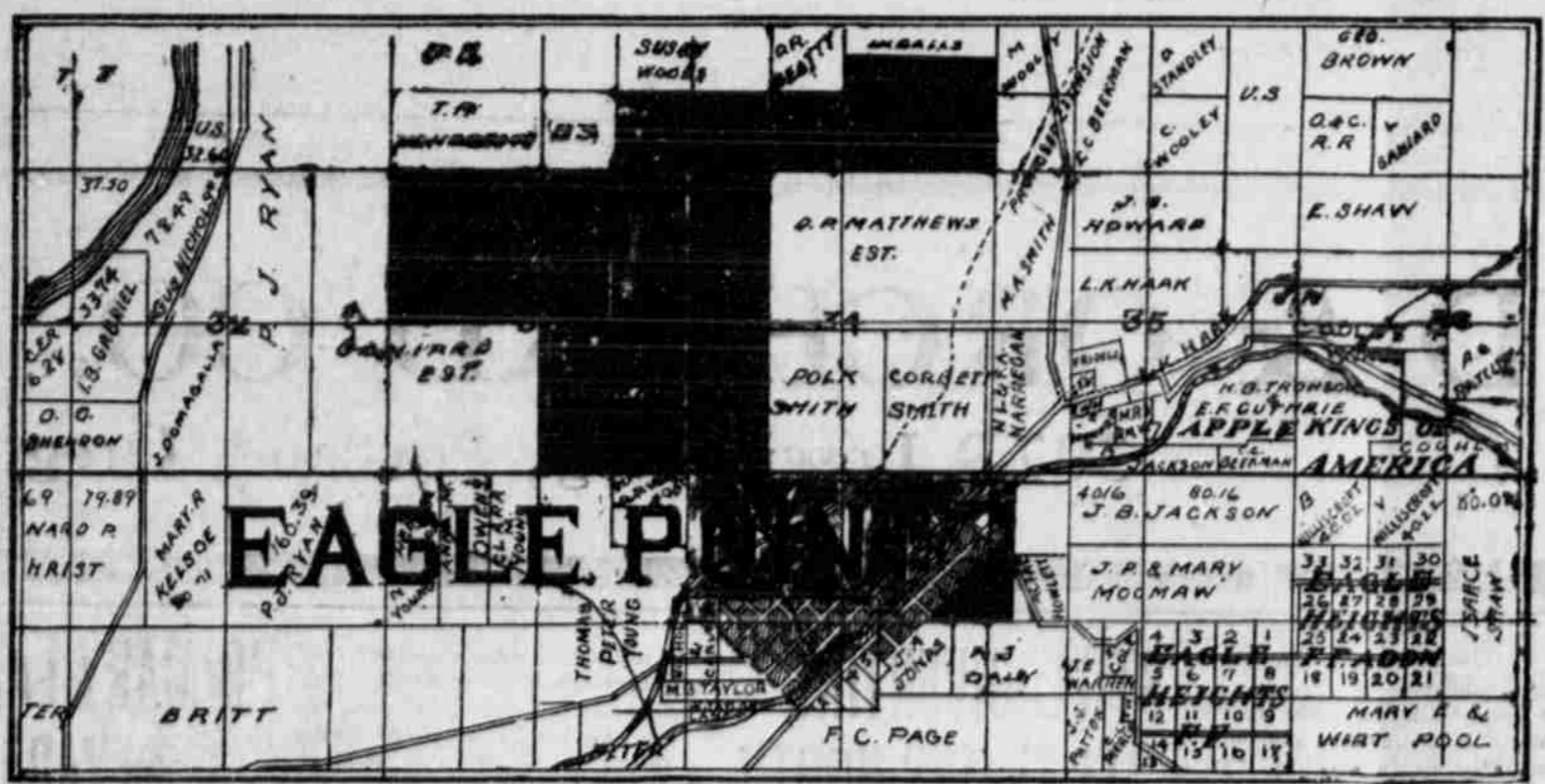
