EDITORS FAVOR OLD UNCLE JOE

Eighteenth Congressional District Editors Are on Record as Favoring Re-election of Cannon to the Speakership in the House.

DANVILLE, Ill., March 5.—Editors of 36 Republican and independent daily newspapers in the 18th congressional district of Illinois, Speaker Cannon's home district, are on record today as favoring the re-election of Cannon to the speakership, and approving the attitude of President Taft in "proceeding to redeem platform pledges."

The following are resolutions drawn by a committee of prominent district editors adopted by an editorial convention without a dissenting vote:

"We, the Republican editors of the 18th congressional district, assembled in Danville, Ill., on this 4th day of March, 1910, adopt the following resolutions:

"Resolved, That as President Taft closes the first year of his term this day, and has but fairly had time to begin work, yet he has made remarkable progress, as shown by the following facts:

"The president is further proceeding in this present regular session of congress in redeeming platform pledges. He has submitted to both houses special messages, recommendation of legislation approved by the Republican national convention and to this legislative program indorsed by the president and his able ally, the Hon. Joseph G. Cannon, speaker of the house of representatives, we pledge our hearty and unqualified support.

"We condemn all captious criticism of the president at this early date, while he is honestly trying to fully redeem his party pledges as ultimately un-Republican and reckless.

"We insist that honest devotion to Republican principles demand that President Taft, the leader of our party, be given a square deal.

"Resolved, That the Republican editors of the 18th congressional district of Illinois, in harmony with the Republican sentiment in the district, take an unusual pride in the record of our distinguished representative, Joseph G. Cannon, who for 36 years has honestly and fearlessly represented Illinois in the greatest executive body in the world.

"In all that time his honest courage and loyalty to the country and the Republican party have been recognized throughout the nation by men of all parties and political opinions.

"For seven years he has occupied the speaker's chair, and as the executive right hand of Presidents Roosevelt and Taft he has aided in writing more wise and progressive laws on the statute books than has ever been written in a like period

since the beginning of the government. Therefore, be it "Resolved, That we ask Hon. J. G. Cannon to be our candidate for the 62d congress and we pledge him our unwavering support."

DENVER, Colo., March 5.—Dr. N. F. Roller of Seattle is today hailed as the conqueror of Raoul De Rouen, the French heavyweight wrestler, following a rough match here last night which resembled a fight more than a wrestling bout.

Roller won after 15 minutes of wrestling for the second fall on a foul. It took the Seattle man 36 minutes and 32 seconds to throw the Frenchman the first time.

In the second bout both of them did some rough work. Roller slammed his opponent's head around on the mat every time he got a chance, while the Frenchman nearly pulled the hair from Roller's head with his teeth. Rouen finally was disqualified for repeated use of the strangle-hold.

CREST OF FLOOD PASSES IN IDAHO

Traffic, However, is Still Indefinitely Blocked—Zero Weather is Experienced—Serious Flood Feared in Upper Missouri in Montana.

LEWISTON, Idaho, March 5.—The Snake and Clearwater rivers both fell somewhat during the night and it is believed the crest of the flood has passed. Cold winds and a clear sky promise to check the floods on the prairies and zero weather is reported from mining camps along the headwaters of the Clearwater.

Traffic is still indefinitely suspended and only the line from Camas Prairie to Grangeville being in operation, with new slides being reported almost constantly along the Clearwater line and the Riparia branch.

The electric line from Moscow to Spokane was open yesterday and arrangements were being made to run Northern Pacific trains over it, but washouts near Palouse blocked it again today.

HELENA, Mont., March 5.—It is feared that a serious flood will result along the upper Missouri river on account of the unusually high water for the first time this year. The river already is higher than it has been at any time during the month of March in five years.
