

MORAN AND TOMMY M. CARTHY TO FIGHT

Fans Speculating as to Outcome of Battle—Will Meet in April—Boys Must Make One Hundred and Thirty-two Pounds.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 5.—Fight fans today are speculating on the probable outcome of the 20-round fight between Owen Moran, the little English scrapper, and Tommy McCarthy, a local lad, who are matched to fight in April before the Broadway Athletic club. Jimmy Griffin, who matched the youngsters, has not set the exact date, but it is expected that the clash will be scheduled for April 15. It is quite probable that Moran will take on Matty Baldwin in Kansas City for a ten-round no-decision fight in the meantime. He has a tentative offer from Kansas City promoters to meet Baldwin sometime this month. According to the articles for the Moran-McCarthy go, the boys are to make 132 pounds at 7 o'clock on the night of the bout.

MCKINLEY'S COUSIN IS WOULD-BE MURDERER

PITTSBURG, Pa., March 5.—Edward C. Miller, formerly a society man of Canton, O., and who claims to be a cousin of the late President William McKinley, is in jail here today awaiting the result of a bullet he fired into the neck of Mrs. Alexander Wright of Sewickley, Pa. "This is the end of two has-beens," Miller declared when he drew his revolver and shot the woman. The bullet was imbedded in her neck. Physicians at the hospital to which she was removed feared she would not recover from the wound. Miller was denied bail. No cause is known for the shooting.

Railroad Official on Coast.
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 5.—Ruler of 8000 miles of railroad, Henry U. Mudge, president of the Rock Island road, is here today for a brief tour of the coast. CONGRESS SAYS TO PEARY; SHOW ME

Commander Must Produce Proof That He Reached North Pole If He Would Receive Honor at the Hands of Congress.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 5.—The movement to secure the thanks of congress for Commander Robert E. Peary for discovering the north pole created a new and puzzling situation today.

Representative R. B. Macon, a member of the sub-committee on naval affairs, which is considering the matter, has demanded that Peary produce the proofs that he reached the north pole. Peary refused to do so.

Representative Macon declared that he did not believe any member of the committee would consent to legislation to secure a vote of thanks for Peary without seeing the grounds for it.

Professor Gannett of the coast and geodetic survey and a member of the National Geographical society, told the committee that Peary objected to submitting the proofs where they might become public property, as Peary desired to use them in newspaper and magazine articles.

At the time Professor Gannett was speaking he had a copy of the proofs in his possession, but refused to surrender it to the committee.

Davenport to Oregon.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 5.—Homer Davenport, the cartoonist, expects to leave San Francisco today for his old home in Oregon. Davenport arrived here yesterday from Point Loma, Southern California, where he has been recuperating at the home of A. G. Spaulding for two months.

Weston Well on His Way.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., March 5.—Edward Payson Weston left Springer today for Balcon on his walk across the continent from the Pacific to the Atlantic ocean. Yesterday he walked from Shoemaker to Springer, a distance of 42 miles. The aged pedestrian arrived there last night at 7:30. He expects to spend Sunday at Trinidad, Colo.
