## CATCHER DUKE OF MEDFORD LET OUT

### Sacramento Team Drops Baseball Player Alleged to Hall From This City—Local Sports Do Not Know Anything of Him.

The Sacramento Bee of Sunday's date contains the following information regarding an alleged Medford aspirant for baseball honors:

"The first member of the Sacramento Coast league squad to get his release is Catcher Duke of Medford, Or., whose playing at the ripp grounds during the last two days has electrified his teammates and fans who saw. Duke, after a valiant effort to break in as a backstop, was told yesterday that his calling did not appear to be the national game, and rather than stick with the squad and ultimately learn that he was not wanted, he had better take up his trade as a barber or bartender.

"Duke broke into the training squad Thursday with the promise that he would show them some baseball. He succeeded without a doubt. He is a heavy-set fellow about 35 years of age, and all he had in his repertoire as a player was nerve. He had enough of that to distribute about the team. He was the hardest worker in the squad and accomplished less. He spoke of a fellow in Aberdeen who "could not knock .200 or fling to second."

Although given no encouragement by the management, he concluded it would be a cinch to be the regular backstop for the Senators, and on Thursday wired for his wife and family to come down from Aberdeen. Yesterday he took a terrific workout, sliding to bases in true Ty Cobb style and galloping around like a kitten. In his mind he was making a great hit, and when Manager Graham advised him that there was little chance of beating the other Senators out of a job, his jaw in disappointment fell clear to his waist-line. Graham advised him to go back north, get work at his trade, and play Sunday ball, as his chances of improvement at the age of 35 were slim.

Duke decided that he would wait until his family arrived here, and make California his home. His dreams of being a big leaguer have been given a sad awakening, but Duke is game."

## BERLIN INTELLECTUALS IN MONSTER MEETING

BERLIN, March 7.—The "intellectuals," consisting of 14,000 representatives of the sciences and arts, education, commerce and trade, held a meeting today to protest against the existing Prussian suffrage and the new government bill.

The speakers declared that the bill simply turns the emperor's promised reform into a laughing stock, and leaves Prussia in a worse state than Turkey.

A resolution demanding equal political rights for all classes was adopted unanimously.

A large number of those who took part in the meeting attempted to go to the palace, but were dispersed by the police. It was the emperor's personal expressed wish that the police should not interfere with the demonstrators unless they went beyond bounds.

## CANADA'S TIME TABLES KNOCKED OUT BY NEW LAW

MONTREAL, March 7.—According to statements made today by prominent railroad officials, the operation of the so-called Lancaster act of parliament regulating the speed at which trains shall pass level crossings, which became effective on February 1, has completely demoralized traffic. It is stated that no train in the past 26 days has been able to make schedule time.

Eight thousand crossings on the Canadian Pacific and 5000 on the Grand Trunk alone are involved. Officials and travelers assert that unless the law is revoked traffic must undergo complete revision.
