KNOX, JR., TAKES A BRIDE; TROUBLE

Son of Attorney-General Slips Away From School to Wed Young Lady of Providence—Have Disappeared.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 8.—Although police officials, reporters and anxious friends boarded the federal express at almost every station on its run today, no trace of Phillander C. Knox, Jr., or of Mrs. Knox was found. Young Knox, the son of the secretary, had been expelled from Morris Heights school because he would not admit or deny that he had married. Miss May Bolser of Providence yesterday asserted that he was married to Knox at Burlington, Vermont. Late last night a rumor was current that the young persons and Principal Green of the school, were aboard the federal express bound for Washington where parental forgiveness and blessing awaited. None of the three passengers could be found, however. A discreet conductor suggested that they might have left the train at Baltimore or Philadelphia but could not be induced to state definitely where the trio alighted. WELLINGTON DEAD WILL NUMBER 90

Every Car Is Found and Total Number of Dead Is Reduced—Rotaries Again to Battle With Drifts—Lines Will Soon Be Opened Again.

WELLINGTON, Wash., March 8.—With every car found and the scattered effects of the railroad company sorted and put together today, it is known that not more than 90 people met death in the Wellington avalanche. Fifty-four bodies have been recovered to date and between twenty-six and thirty-six remain in the debris. The railroad company's official list of passengers and crews contain 101 names. To this has been added 30 Italians, making a total of 131. It has been learned, however, that many of the Italians were counted in the railroad list and probably not more than 115 people were carried down with the trains in the avalanche. It is impossible to compile an exact list of those who escaped but they number 25 to 35. Packers are hauling coal to the rotaries stalled between here and Seaside today, and by this afternoon the dead plows should have steam up and be again battling with the drifts. The roar of giant powder and dynamite is already booming and echoing in the mountains where the Great Northern laborers are blasting away the ice and snow on the tracks. The two rotaries will have a crew of 300 men but it is not expected they will be able to clear the track to Wellington before Thursday. The line from the east through the tunnel will be cleared today. Men who came through the tunnel this morning state that the rotaries can be seen throwing the snow high in the air from the east portal and will soon be through. The line from Seattle will be clear far enough up the mountain after today to take out the remaining dead by train hereafter. 6,000 STRONG, MEN WILL DEMAND REFORM

Spokane Labor Bodies Will March In Body to Call Upon Council to Ask for Higher Wages and Matrons.

SPOKANE, Wash., March 8.—Organized labor 6000 strong will march on the city hall tonight and demand of the council higher wages for municipal laborers and teamsters and the appointment of three police matrons. In this campaign not only on-ly union labor but the women's clubs and the United German Societies are standing for these reforms. The council has three times granted the higher wage and twice has granted the police matrons, but each time reconsidered and rescinded its action. Tonight the three big organizations will put the question up to the council and if its requests are not granted within twenty-four hours labor leaders will start recall petitions against every member of the council and initiate petitions for the measures desired. Serious charges are made against the manner in which the woman's wards of the city hall are conducted, and affidavits have been secured by the women's club setting forth alleged mistreatment of women prisoners confined there.
