TO PROBE HIGH PRICES FOR FISH

senator in California Regarding Alleged Fish Combine,

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 8. —Immediate astion tending toward the prosecution of wholesalers alleged to have combined to keep the price of fish at a certain price, is promised today by State Senator E. T. Wolfe, and Attorney General U. S. Webb, following an investigation by the state senate committee on the high price of living.

For several days the committee has Leen busy probing into the dealings of the wholesale fish dealers, who it is declared have combined since the Ban Francisco fire in 1906 to stifle competition and maintain high prices for fish.

Should the actions be brought, the members of the alleged fish trust will be prosecuted under the Cartwright anti-trust law.

During the investigation, testimony was offered tending to prove that the wohlesalers prevented dealers from purchasing fish from Puget Sound and the Columbia River fishermen for consumption here. \$11000 buys a 40-acre, 2 1-2 miles from Eagle Point on a main country road and under Fish Lake ditch. Buildings and other improvements are worth \$3800... Sixteen acres are in 6 and 7-year old Spitzenberg and Newtown apples.
