

FARMING EXPERT CHOOSES ROGUE

F. E. Trigg, Who Has Gained Wide Fame as a Writer Upon Farm Problems, Has Decided to Locate in the Rogue River Valley.

In a recent number of The American Press, the publication of the American Press Association, which furnishes thousands upon thousands of papers in the United States with "ready to print" articles, appears the following:

"There is no more valuable feature of its kind than 'Farm, Orchard and Garden,' the three column weekly review of agricultural and horticultural subjects issued by the American Press Association and written by F. E. Trigg of Rockford, Ia. The numerous readers of this department will be interested in a note which Mr. Trigg has decided on making. For some years he has edited the Register at Rockford and with L. M. Trigg has operated Wildwood Fruit Farm, two miles northwest of that place. Last fall he took a trip through Oregon and looked over the famous Hood and Rogue river valleys. The result was he decided to locate in Central Point in the latter valley, which is situated in Jackson county, in the southwestern part of the state. Speaking of his intentions, the editor of 'Farm, Orchard and Garden' writes:

"I have felt for some time past that with so much of the detail work on my hands in connection with the newspaper here at Rockford I was not in a position to give the preparation of my syndicate matter the attention which it deserves, and quite the major motive in the contemplated move west is that I may have more time in which to prepare it. Aside from the consideration of scenery, climate, people and future of the country in a business way, tending to make the Rogue river country a section one would desire to live in, it has a greater versatility agriculturally and horticulturally than any other section with which I am acquainted in the United States. Wheat, barley, clover and alfalfa are grown with great success, while corn does better than anywhere else on the coast. In the line of fruit it produces apples in remarkable abundance and of the finest quality, is the greatest pear belt in the world, while peaches, apricots, prunes, cherries, almonds, walnuts, figs, grapes and a long list of small fruits grow to greatest perfection. It has seemed to me, in view of this state of things, that residence here, where I could secure first hand information concerning so great a variety of products would be of great assistance to me. For the present at least it is our intention to live on a ranch and develop it with such assistance as may be needed. In addition to more time spent in preparation of my notes, I plan to travel through the south and east and acquaint myself with agricultural and horticultural conditions. While 95 per cent of the fruit in the Rogue valley is produced without irrigation, a system is being arranged and will be completed within a year which will carry water to any part of the valley. This will be another subject about which I will be able to get valuable first hand information."

Mr. Trigg has arrived in the valley and will reside near Central Point.

GOMPERS DECLARES THAT PROHIBITION A FAILURE

CHICAGO, Mar. 9.—"Prohibition is a failure" declared President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor today. "I am not in sympathy with the movement," declared Mr. Gompers to the disappointment of the local prohibitionists who had hoped for a declaration supporting their cause. Gompers' remarks followed an invitation extended him by local opponents to address a meeting and the labor leader refused and his refusal effectively blocked an attack by the opponents to get him to declare himself in hope that organized labor would be induced to endorse the crusade for a "dry Chicago".

BODIES OF WELLINGTON VICTIMS REACH SEATTLE

SEATTLE, Wash., March 9.—Six bodies, the last of the 54 recovered at Wellington, are in Seattle today, brought in by train from Seaside. The bodies are those of G. W. Beagle, J. Ladue, John Tucker, J. D. Fox and two unidentified men. The body of express messenger Beagle will be taken to Tacoma for burial. The bodies of W. M. May and the Starrett children were taken to Victoria today. Mrs. M. A. Covington will be buried in Olympia this afternoon.

"BLACK HAND" IS AFTER CARUSO

Famous Singer Guarded by Detail of Nearly One Hundred Policemen—Has Been Threatened With Death by Black Hand Society.

NEW YORK, March 9.—Nearly one hundred policemen were in the audience last night when Caruso sang at the Academy in Brooklyn. They were there, not as lovers in the drama, but as a body guard for the famous tenor who recently received two threatening letters from the "Black Hand."

The police are taking extraordinary precautions to prevent injury to the Italian singer. A detail of several detectives accompanies Caruso daily while the theater where he appears nightly is guarded by eighty men.

Caruso professes not to believe that the "Black Hand" threats portend death. The tenor has defied his would-be blackmailers and refuses to pay tribute to the writers of the anonymous letters. The police fear that Caruso's defiance to the "Black Hand" may result in an outrage that would lead to international entanglements.

AMERICAN EXPOSITION IN BERLIN IS PLANNED

BERLIN, Mar. 9.—The American Exposition will be held here during the coming summer as originally planned, the directors having today rejected the suggestion of the American commissioners that the exposition be postponed until 1911 and then be converted into an American-German exposition.

It was decided that Herr Deibrucek, remark that the Reichstag and the Government had given no "moral support," to the enterprise had been fully explained. General Manager Willmer was authorized to cable the American committee the decision of the directors and to state that in the light of all circumstances any obstacle to holding the exposition as planned had been removed.

\$22,000,000 FOR BUILDINGS AND SITE FOR GOVERNMENT

WASHINGTON, Mar. 9.—A bill appropriating \$10,000,000 for all the ground south of Pennsylvania avenue, not now owned by the government, was taken up by the Senate this afternoon. It is not believed that \$10,000,000 will be sufficient to secure all the ground desired, and the Secretary of the Treasury would be authorized to pay that much on account. It is intended to hold all the land, when acquired, for the erection of government buildings.

The bill will meet with stubborn opposition in both branches of the Congress. An appropriation of \$12,000,000 was today recommended by the Senate Committee on Public Buildings and Grounds, for the erection of one or more buildings on the ground already acquired by the Government south of Pennsylvania avenue between Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets. The site cost \$2,500,000. One mammoth structure or two modern buildings are intended to provide new homes for the Department of State, Justice, Commerce and Labor. It was originally intended to appropriate \$15,000,000 for the new homes.

An ordinance assessing the property adjacent to and benefited by the six and eight-inch lateral sewer constructed along South Ivy street for the cost of constructing the same and providing the manner of carrying said assessments into full effect.

The City of Medford doth ordain as follows:

Section 1. And each of said parcels is hereby assessed the amount set opposite its description below for the construction of said sewer.
