CONSPIRACY WITH BANKER IS DENIED

Reddy Answers Suit Charging Oregon Trust Money Bought the Pacific & Eastern—Says Sale Was Legitimate.

PORTLAND, March 9.—Denying that he "conspired" with George Estes and the officers of the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank to obtain \$27,500 in funds from the corporation with which to purchase the Medford & Crater Lake railroad, Receiver J. F. Reddy, for the railroad, has filed his answer in the circuit court to the civil suit brought against him and Estes and the officers of the bank for alleged misappropriation of the bank's funds for the purchase of the railroad. The other defendants with Reddy and Estes are W. H. Moore, W. C. Morris, E. E. Lytle, Leo Friede, Henry A. Moore and S. W. Stryker.

In the suit which Thomas C. Devlin brought as receiver of the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank he charged that Reddy sold the road to Estes for \$82,500, and then conspired with Estes and the officers of the bank to pay for the road from the bank's funds. Estes was an employee of the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank, being manager of its bond and trust department. The Estacada State Bank, of which Estes was president and Stryker a director, was also implicated in the deal.

In his answer to the charges, Receiver Reddy admits that he sold the railroad to Estes, who, he says, was the highest bidder. In payment for the road, he says he received from Estes a cashier's note of the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank for \$100,000 and certificates of deposit in the same bank in the aggregate principal sum of \$8500. Reddy says this sale was confirmed by the circuit court of Jackson county, and that he executed the deed conveying the property to Estes, and on the further order of the Jackson county court he states that he left the funds and proceeds of the sale on deposit with and with the distribution or further order of the court.

As to whether or not the certificates of deposit and cashier's check were issued by the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank upon Estes actually made in the bank by Reddy, Reddy says he has no knowledge, but declares that he relied upon the credit of the bank issuing the cashier's check and certificates of deposit. He disclaims all knowledge of the alleged "conspiracy" and maintains that he played his part in the transaction in entire good faith. Reddy is represented by Attorney Franklin T. Griffith.

WELCOME THE COMING AND SPEED THE PARTING CONSUL

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 9.—Following the arrival of the new Chinese consul-general, Li Wing Yu, to San Francisco, the Chinese residents today gave a farewell parade to the former consul-general, Hsu Ping Cheng, who, with his family, sailed on the Mongolia for China today.

Consul Li arrived yesterday on one of the eastern belated trains. He acted as consul-general of this district 15 years ago. Soon after his arrival the new official was given a reception at the Six Companies building. During a speech before his countrymen, Li declared that he would endeavor to have the Chinese immigration station removed from Angel Island, as the location of the station there is strongly objected to by the Chinese residents of the Pacific coast.
