10,000 RIOTERS IN BATTLE.

(Continued from Page 1.)

Alarmed at the prospective spread of the Philadelphia general strike through Pennsylvania and the nation, business interests here today issued a call for a mass meeting to be held tomorrow night in an effort to settle the industrial strife.
Every endeavor will be made by the merchants and storekeepers, by civic bodies and benevolent organizations to compel both sides in the controversy to make mutual concessions in the interests of city and state and national peace.
The car strike and the general sympathetic strike that followed has gained new life by an action of the State Federation of Labor in favoring a nation-wide strike.
Union Leaders Elated.
Today labor leaders here are elated and confident. They predict that the walkout of the employees of the Baldwin locomotive works will be the forerunner of a series of strikes in "open shop" factories and yards which will compel capital to bring pressure on the Philadelphia Rapid Transit company to cause its officials to yield.
The leaders of labor say that hundreds of non-union employees have joined the sympathetic strike and that hundreds more will join the movement.
Thousands of strikers and their sympathizers have been called to assemble this evening at Lehigh and Broad streets to march to the Philadelphia National baseball park, where a mass meeting was scheduled.
Director of Public Safety Henry Clay, on learning of the plan, issued a proclamation forbidding the assemblage of citizens at the points designated under penalty of arrest on the charge of riot and conspiracy to incite riot.
Union leaders, however, asserted that they will not be deprived of their right to gather peacefully and that the procession will form and will march to the ball park.
Clay, on hearing of their attitude, ordered every available policeman and special policeman to be prepared for riot duty.
A feature of the great strike today was the picketing of union men at the entrance to the Cramp's shipyards, at the Baldwin locomotive works and at the gates of other large factories.
The yards contain several large and small vessels under construction for the government and for private firms.

Quarrel Ends Fatally.

STEVENSON, Wash., March 10.—Quarreling over the relative merits of two mineral springs, Robert St. Martin, aged 55, today killed Amos Brown, 60 years old, by plunging a knife into his heart. Sheriff Knox of Skamania county is searching for Brown, who immediately following the killing disappeared in the Cascade forest.
The tragedy is the culmination of years of bitter controversy over the springs, one of which was owned by St. Martin, a halfblood Indian. The men met early today and renewed the quarrel, which resulted in St. Martin's death.
