

## MEDFORD MEN VIEW BULL FIGHT

But They Are Not Much Enthused With the Entertainment — Too Much Blood and the Bull Has Too Little Chance.

George and Charles King, H. U. Lumsden and C. I. Hutchison are in Mexico looking over some mining and timber investments. Having an opportunity to see a genuine bull fight pulled off in the regular Spanish style, they attended one at a big celebration near the city of Mexico the other day.

Mr. Hutchison writes to his father, F. W. Hutchison, that while the exhibition was exciting, it wasn't particularly pleasant.

Six bulls and 18 horses were killed. The horses were ridden into the ring blindfolded and had no chance to escape the sharp horns of the bulls. The bulls didn't have any more of a chance, for after three or four horses had been killed the matador put the quietus on the bull.

One man was injured by his horse falling on him when the bull charged, and the bull was loudly applauded by the audience for the act. It didn't save him, however, from the fatal sword of the matador.

The party expects to be in the interior of Mexico for several weeks before returning home.

The things he said when he came up about the general cussedness of brute creation in general and the base ingratitude of that particular specimen of the equine breed created the blue haze which was visible around the foothills Thursday morning.

### PORTLAND GIRL GETS IN TROUBLE IN SAN FRANCISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, March 10.—Miss Frances Glibreth of Portland, a comely girl of 19, is in the city prison today awaiting extradition to Portland on a charge of abduction of Miss Mitty Briggs, 15 years of age, also of Portland.

The girls, according to the police, came to this city recently and were to have married two young men from Oregon. Miss Glibreth is said to have been betrothed to Harry Bond, while Miss Briggs was the alleged fiancée of George Borne. Bond is said to be a scion of a wealthy family in a small Oregon town.

The four young persons disappeared from their homes simultaneously. The police of the coast cities were notified of the disappearance.

The arrest of Miss Glibreth followed and Miss Briggs is being held at the detention home. Both will return to Portland. The young men are expected here today and it is probable they, too, will be sent to Portland.

## WALL FALLS, 30 MEN BURIED

Bodies of Two Women Recovered—Nine Injured Rescued—Wall Was Portion of Factory Building.

### PITTSBURG, Pa., March 10.—

The bodies of two women were recovered today from the ruins of a wall which collapsed here today and buried between 25 and 30 workmen of the Lanz & Sons doll factory beneath it, according to police reports. Policemen and firemen removed nine injured workmen from the outer debris of the wall and began an attempt to extricate other victims. The wall was a portion of the factory building.

### LOS ANGELES UNION MEN TO TALK OF BIG STRIKE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 10.—The central labor council of Los Angeles today indorsed plans for a mass meeting to be held next Sunday afternoon to discuss the Philadelphia strike situation.

President Engle of the central labor council, will preside. Carl Brown, a labor leader who was a leader in Coxe's famous army, will be one of the speakers.

Engle stated today that a resolutions committee will be appointed. This committee probably will present to the meeting a statement of sympathy with the Philadelphia strikers for indorsement. Every union in Los Angeles will be represented officially at the meeting.
