WASHINGTON, D. C., March 11.—Representative James B. Perkins of Rochester, N. Y., died at 10:15 o'clock this morning. He had been ill at Garfield Hospital for several weeks.

As representative from New York he served in the 57th, 58th, 59th and 60th congresses and was re-elected to the 61st by a large majority over four opponents.

His work on the committee of foreign affairs of which he was made chairman at the beginning of this congress was largely instrumental in accomplishing the recent reforms in the consular service.

According to the story told by the little child, she was found by the Indians after she had been deserted by her father, a wood chopper, who left in search of work. The child said she had starved two days in the lonely cabin in the woods when a fishing party of Indians found her and adopted her into the tribe.

The child's mother had died some time before her father left her.

When Mr. and Mrs. Berlin found the girl among the Indians they readily surrendered her, declaring that it was best for the child to grow up among her own people.
