## PEARY ACCUSED OF INGRATITUDE

Wife of Matt Henson, Negro, Who Went With Peary to Pole, Accuses Commander With Forgetting Her Husband.

NEW YORK, March 11.—Commander Robert E. Peary today stands accused of ingratitude and forgetfulness by Mrs. Matt Henson, wife of the negro who accompanied Peary on the dash to the north pole.

"My husband," she said today at her home in this city, "is away on a lecture tour. Since they returned from the pole Peary has dropped Matt entirely, and has held no communication with him nor done a single thing in recognition of his 20 years' service, to say nothing of Matt's having saved Peary's life on more than one occasion. It seems to me such treatment is not fair."

"So far as Peary knows, or cares, for all the interest he has shown, Matt might be starving to death. Such ingratitude is pretty hard. Probably Peary, who is getting all the money, has no time to think of Matt, to whom much of the success of the expedition was due. Matt has never mentioned the matter to Peary, but it does seem as if his hard work of over 20 years might be more fittingly rewarded than by silence and forgetfulness."

## WORK OF IMPROVING SCHOOL PARK BEGINS

J. A. Gilbertson, the landscape gardener, from Ashland, who has been engaged by the Ladies' Improvement club to superintend the parking of the school grounds in Central Point, came down from Ashland recently and, with the members of the school board and a committee from the ladies' club, went over the grounds and formulated tentative plans for the work. An area of nearly one-third of the grounds will be covered by the ladies in their work. The running water that now occupies one corner of the grounds will be converted into an artificial lake. Maple trees will be planted all around the grounds and Boston Ivy will be planted so that it will cover the sides of the building.

The ladies are meeting with every encouragement in their campaign of civic improvement and it is to be hoped that there will be no stopping of the work until Central Point can boast of one of the nicest parks of Southern Oregon.

The Klamath chamber of commerce has memorialized congress to appropriate \$25,000 for the improvement of Crater Lake national park.
