

SWALLOWS A FORK; DOCTORS CUT IT OUT

Girl Accidentally Swallows Full Grown Table Fork and is Forced to Undergo Operation.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 12.—Miss Bridget Brady is recovering rapidly today following an operation for the removal of a full-sized table fork from her stomach.

The young woman swallowed the fork Wednesday evening. She was suffering from a sore throat and had placed the handle of the fork in her throat in an effort to ascertain whether the tonsils were swollen.

The powerful muscles gripped the handle and a moment later the fork slipped down her esophagus and came to rest crosswise in her stomach.

Despite the nausea the girl kept her head and called for help. She was hastened to the hospital, where an X-ray located the offending fork.

After thirty-five hours of suffering she was operated on. A long incision was made through the walls of the stomach and the fork withdrawn.

WRIGHT BROTHERS BLOCK AERONAUTS

Henry Farnum Says Aviators Are Stopping All Progress in the World of Aeronautics.

PARIS, March 12.—"The Wright brothers are now blocking the entire world in the matter of the development of aeronautics," said Henry Farnum, following the annual prize distribution of the Aero club of France at the Sorbonne.

"It is to be expected that Paulhan will win in his litigation against the Wright brothers, owing to the prejudice of American courts against a foreigner. But should Glenn Curtiss be more successful the result will be quite as satisfactory as a victory for Paulhan, and the science of aviation will advance with a leap."

"The action of the Wrights cannot permanently stop the progress of aviation, but it can and, if successful, will hold America in the background in this latest science."

MRS. SAGE CAREFUL IN DISPERSING CHARITY

PASADENA, Cal., March 12.—Her intuition, which she declares seldom fails her, is Mrs. Russell Sage's sole guide in her distribution for charitable purposes of the millions gathered by her late financier husband.

In a signed article appearing today in a local daily paper, today's issue of which was devoted to "charity," Mrs. Sage explained her methods of giving and elaborated the conditions which govern her benefactions.

The paper was edited today by the Rev. Malcolm James McLeod, who has accepted a salary of \$15,000 a year to assume the pastorate of the Collegiate Reformed church of New York, of which Mrs. Sage is a parishioner.

"I am inquisitive," Mrs. Sage writes, "and I want to know the particular conditions governing every case in which I become interested. While a force of clerks is employed to attend to the drudgery of handling my cases, I am careful to give each my personal supervision."
