No money is to be paid out except upon estimates by the engineer in charge and after being audited and approved by the committee, which consists of leading bankers and business men of Medford.

No money is to be paid for rights of way.

The route to be followed will be that selected by the government engineer as the most feasible and economical.

The money is deposited in the four banks of Medford, whose presidents comprise the advisory board of the commission.

The subscriptions call for half payment June 1, 1910, the remaining half in June, 1911.

### JACK CUDAHY FLEES BEFORE NOTORIETY

Reported That Assailant of Lillis Will Rush West to Pasadena to Get Away From Indignant Friends.

CHICAGO, Ill., March 15.—Jack Cudahy, who has been secluded here in the home of Joy Morton of 23 Lake Shore Drive since his disappearance after attacking banker Jere S. Lillis, left Chicago today.

It was reported that his destination was Pasadena, Cal., where his parents are spending the winter.

Cudahy took refuge at Morton's home to escape the notoriety following his sensational attack on Lillis with a carving knife.

It is rumored that he intends to quit Kansas City and make his home either at Chicago or Omaha. Since he left Kansas City Cudahy has been seen only by a few close friends. He has refused to make any sort of statement other than was in Chicago to "keep out of the limelight."

It is believed that John I. Moss, Cudahy's chauffeur who was present when Cudahy attacked Lillis, is in this city.

It is understood that Moss tried to get into communication with Cudahy without success.

### JUDGE REJECTS DOCTOR'S OFFER TO KILL LUNATICS

MONTGOMERY, Mo., March 15.—Dr. David O. Hudson, member of the state medical association, former county physician and member of the present school board, today advocated giving a dose of prussic acid to all who come into the world as idiots or who become hopelessly insane and are confined in the insane asylums and county infirmaries throughout the country.

Dr. Hudson said it is a doctrine of mercy. The drug would put them to sleep forever, out of their misery, and it would take but from three to ten minutes to perform the operation.

As county physician he suggested to the county court his willingness to apply the "mercy tablets" to a number of incurables at the county farm here, but the court said their lives must be allowed to exist, miserable and incurable though they are.
