## YELLOW PERIL BOGEY AGAIN

Threats of Japanese Invasion Used to Bluff Congress into Ordering More Battleships and Strengthening Defenses—Builders Behind It.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 19.

Once more the lowering yellow war cloud glooms the country. Once more the threatening skeletons of our national helplessness are dragged forth from their musty closets and furnished up to be placed before the trembling public. Once more the tales of 500,000 little yellow men dumped onto our western coast to ravage and destroy are told in tones of apprehension and dismay.

War, bloody war, with the dissolution of the United States at the end of it, the entire country impoverished, and the now free American citizen ground beneath the heavy yellow heel of the little men from the east, is again foretold, with the grave wagging of heads and much bewailing the disappearance of the "good old American spirit."

"Absolutely defenseless," "at the mercy of the invader," "our unprotected coasts," "our merchant marine—the minus quantity," and all the old stock phrases of the patriotic prophet of the dire disaster of the nation are again in evidence. Up and down the corridors in congress, in the anteroom at the White House, in hotel lobbies, along the spacious streets of the capital, and most of all, in the newspapers, are the words being to be found.

Once more appears the "Japanese plans for invading the Pacific coast," found by the ubiquitous "secret agent of a foreign government," who pursues his Machiavellian vocation from capital to capital.
