FAIRBANKS BACK TRIP AROUND GLOBE

Thousands of Cheering People Greet Former Vice-President — School Children Parade in Welcome.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., March 24.—Charles Warren Fairbanks, former vice-president of the United States, and Mrs. Fairbanks are at their home in Indianapolis after a tour around the world. He was given a rousing welcome. As his train rolled into the station the vice-presidential salute boomed out, while regimental bands played the "General's March."

Thousands of cheering people were gathered at the station and lined the streets through which Fairbanks' carriage passed on its way to his home on Meridian street.

A detachment of cavalry from Ft. Benjamin Harrison and a number of companies of the National Guard formed an escort and thousands of school children were drawn up along the streets through which the parade moved.

A delegation of mayors from the principal cities of Indiana acted as a special reception committee.
