CASE MAY NOT COME TO TRIAL

Appeal From Justice Court of H. B. Holmes for Selling Misbranded Butter Will Most Likely be Dismissed.

Before Judge Calkins the matter of the State of Oregon vs. H. B. Holmes et al., accused of having sold butter in violation of the provisions of the pure food law, on appeal from the justice court of Ashland, was argued on a demurrer to the complaint. While overruling the demurrer, Judge Calkins stated that in case the matter would come to trial he would be compelled to instruct that the butter alleged to have been sold under the "Hazelwood" brand was not "tub butter" within the meaning of the statute.

District Attorney Mulkey, in reference to the matter said: "I think the case will be dropped, although the defendant was convicted in the lower court. I am not certain that it would be to the best interest of the district to carry it further. The question hinges on the question of whether the butter sold was tub butter within the meaning of the statute or not, and I do not feel justified in bringing witnesses from the other end of the state at the expense of the county to prove a doubtful point."

FRISCO TO ASK SPECIAL SESSION

Boosters of San Francisco Exposition Will Ask State to Make Suitable Appropriation for Proposed Panama Exposition.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 24.—The "boosters" here who favor San Francisco as the site for the Panama-Pacific exposition in 1915 today are preparing to appeal to Governor Gillett for a call of a special session of the legislature.

The local men today began the work of raising \$5,000,000 for the operation of the fair, but realize that the state must aid the city in making the exposition a complete success.

A meeting was ordered for today at which the incorporation of the fair company will be perfected. As soon as this is done an open and widespread campaign for subscriptions will be begun.

A committee will be appointed this afternoon to proceed to Washington to lay before congress San Francisco has been suggested that April 18, the date of the fourth anniversary of the San Francisco disaster, would be an appropriate one on which to call a special legislative session to aid San Francisco.

MOUNT AETNA IN VIOLENT ERUPTION

Believed Some of Towns Near Volcano Are in Danger—People Wildly Excited, Flee Before Outburst—22 Shocks Are Felt.

CATANIA, March 24.—Attended by frequent earthquake shocks, Mt. Aetna is in violent eruption today.

Flames and smoke are pouring out of a new crater at Volta St. Giacomo, which is between Castello and Albanelli. It is believed some of the towns near the volcano are in danger.

Many people living near the mountain are fleeing, as it is feared that the eruption may grow worse. Tuesday night 22 earthquake shocks were recorded by the government seismographs.

Reports from Nicolesi state that large quantities of lava is pouring from great crevasses which opened on the mountainside.
