

### TO CONSERVE "THE GOOD OLD SUMMER"

Alarmed at investigation into High Cost of Living, Cold-Storage Concerns Build Up Elaborate Method

WASHINGTON, March 26.—Here's a new idea in conservation. Associate Forester Potter proposes to conserve "the good old summer time."

Away up on the mountain tops in the national forest reserves, Potter tells Secretary Wilson that there are any number of winding lakes and crystal streams fringed with cool woods that would make ideal rest cures for residents of our western metropolises. His scheme is to provide for the poorly paid and over-worked slaves of capital, at the cost of about \$5 per annum, tracts of nature which they may fence in and use for their very own, with no restrictions other than the ten commandments and the regulations of the forest service.

Under Potter's plan permits would be issued to applicants good for ten years, unless revoked by the secretary of agriculture. There are now several special permits issued by the forest service for summer homes and one for a hotel, or clubhouse, on the San Bernardino mountains, in California. These are good for only a year at a time. The club house permit, however, has been renewed for several years and has become a quite permanent institution.

Potter's new plan is now passing under the critical eye of Solicitor McCabe of the department of agriculture, because Secretary Wilson does not intend starting anything again unless he knows it is legal even to the crosses of the 's. Unless the solicitor's stern regard for duty compels him to object, the plan should be in operation before long and the people of the west will be able to put in their applications for "country seats" this spring.

### MUCK RAKERS WERE BUSY LONG AGO

New Plan Is Hit Upon by Associate Forester by Which Poor May Have Regular "Country Seats."

WASHINGTON, March 26.—"Muck-rakers of other day," is the title of a speech to be delivered in the house within the next few days by Representative Kahn (Rep., Cal.).

"It is really surprising," remarked Kahn today, "to what lengths the literary muck-flingers went during the earlier days of our history. Washington was attacked time and time again, and mercilessly, too."

"Because he spent \$87,000 upon the White House, he was roasted to a turn from one end of the country to the other. 'And it isn't half-finished, either,' the muck-rakers shouted while jumping on him for this terrible extravagance. Roosevelt spent \$600,000 on the White House not so very long ago, and nobody thought it worth while to throw fits."

"Jefferson and Jackson were particularly singled out by the 'old-time muck-rakers' and their characters as well as their public acts were unmercifully grilled. Even the poet, Tom Moore, took a shot or two at Jefferson."

"The shooting of four soldiers for desertion in the Creek war brought down a perfect avalanche of criticism on Jackson's head. The newspapers ran all sorts of pictures of coffins and gravestones to illustrate the president's fiendishness at this time."
