NEW EQUIPMENT FOR TORPEDO DESTROYER

MARE ISLAND NAVY YARD, Cal., March 26.—Following the complete failure of boilers and engines aboard the torpedo-boat destroyer Hopkins within two years after her overhauling at this yard in July, 1908, the navy department today ordered the installation of new boilers and engines on the little craft.

The Hopkins will be refitted at this yard and her crew held here until she is ready for sea again.

The condition of the Hopkins on her arrival here was such that naval engineers expressed wonder that she was able to proceed up the coast without a disaster similar to that at San Diego on February 14, when several men were killed.

The Hopkins lost the tubes of both boilers yesterday afternoon when near Santa Rosa, Calif. The tug Unatilla was sent to her assistance from this yard.

The Hopkins was first repaired here in July, 1908, after she had accompanied the battleship fleet around Cape Horn. At that time six rows of tubes were installed.

Nine months later, in April, 1909, the Hopkins boilers were renewed. Commander C. A. Carr, under whom the work was done, is now in the bureau of steam engineering at Washington.

GHOST OF MURDERED MAN HAUNTS HIS MURDERER

BOSTON, Mass., March 26.—Because Pasquale Cirillo believed he saw the ghost of Daniel Desmond, whom he and two companions, Dominic Christoforo and Archilo Lucetti, murdered, all three of them confessed and today were sentenced to prison terms ranging from 12 to 15 years each.

Desmond was killed in a fight with a fight with the trio. When arrested they asserted that they were innocent. It was admitted by the authorities that there was not evidence enough to convict them.

Recently Cirillo ran screaming to the door of his cell. When the guards arrived he pleaded with them to take him from the cell, where he declared he saw the ghost of the murdered man.

The next night Cirillo called the guard and begged to be taken from the cell.

"Desmond's ghost comes every night," he said.

Later he confessed, implicating his companions. They maintained that they were innocent until told of Desmond's ghost, when they likewise confessed.

Body of Marine Found.

VALLEJO, Cal., March 26.—The body of A. Connolly, a marine who has been missing since last Saturday, was found today in the tide-lands north of this city.

The man's skull was fractured and his uniform missing.

Naval authorities have begun an investigation to ascertain whether the man was murdered.

## DEVLIN BARRED BY MAN HE FOUGHT

California Attorney Who Convicted Southerner of Land Frauds Blocks His Way for Reappointment.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 26.—It is common gossip around the capitol today that Robert T. Devlin, United States district attorney for the northern district of California, will not be reappointed.

It is rumored that the fight for his reappointment will end when he has presented his case before the senate judiciary committee. The committee already has ordered an adverse report and there is little likelihood that the previous report will be changed. This means that the senate will not confirm his nomination.

The fight against Devlin was started by Dr. E. B. Perrin, who was convicted of land frauds by Devlin. Perrin is a wealthy Southern financier. He enlisted the aid of several United States senators in his fight, and the prevailing opinion is that he has won.

Among the senators who opposed the reappointment of Devlin was Senator Borah of Idaho and Senator Tillman.

It is reported that John McNab, an attorney living in Mendocino county, will secure Devlin's position.

### "MOTHER" OF QUADRUPLTS ARRESTED FOR STEALING

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 26.—Mrs. Catherine Smith, who was alleged to have aided in gathering the four babies for the "quadruplets" presented to an astounded world by Mrs. W. W. Wilson three months ago, must appear in court next Monday to answer to an accusation of child-stealing.

She was arrested upon a charge brought by Sadie Engleman, the mother of one of the "quadruplets," and released on \$2600 bail.

Eadie Engleman alleged in a civil action filed last month that she was at Mrs. Smith's Sunset Boulevard Maternity Home when her baby boy was born and that he was taken away from her without her consent and given to Mrs. Wilson. In this suit \$5000 damages were asked. The Engleman baby was known as "John Doe, 1910," in the hearing in the juvenile court at which the Wilson "quadruplet" hoax was revealed.

The mother now is ill at her home in Lafayette street.

### GRIEF STRIKES DOWN FATHER AT GRAVE'S SIDE

PITTSBURG, Pa., March 26.—Although the death certificate of Louis Zoller, 62, who dropped dead beside his son's grave as the casket was being lowered, will indicate merely that he died from a sudden cardiac affection, his friends knew that a grief greater than he could bear caused his heart to break.

Zoller was a veteran of the civil war and later was a scout with William F. Cody (Buffalo Bill) in the Indian fighter's Nevada campaign.

Zoller's only son died here. Between the two men there has been an unusual affection. Although weakened by the shock of his son's death, the old soldier insisted upon attending the funeral. He bore up bravely until the casket was descending into the flower-lined pit. Suddenly he sank to the ground with a groan. A physician who was at the funeral says Zoller died instantly.

### TEXAS RECRUIT FORCE TO GO TO ESTRADA'S AID

NEW ORLEANS, La., March 26.—General Gordon of Texas, formerly a brigadier of volunteers in the Spanish war, who has been in command of artillery in the Nicaraguan revolutionary army, announced that he had recruited 800 men here to aid in restoring the fallen followers of General Estrada. Gordon recently was reported to have been killed in battle in Nicaragua. He was severely wounded, but managed to escape death and capture.

Agents of President Madriz of Nicaragua are attempting to prevent Gordon's troops from sailing for the south. They have appealed to Washington, but it is believed that the expedition cannot be stopped as it is against a government not officially recognized by the United States.

### GIRL MAKES A FORTUNE BY A LUCKY STRIKE

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., March 26.—Miss Bernadine Preston, a 19-year-old miss, left here for her home in Wales today, just \$10,000 richer than she arrived a few weeks ago. She came here to visit friends. Later she went to Barstow, a new gold camp. She located several claims and during the rush sold out for \$10,000 and some oil stock, which, if the claims of the promoters are realized, will make her worth a million dollars.

For her sudden acquisition of wealth, Miss Preston must be given all credit. When a new lode was discovered just outside Barstow she joined in the rush into the desert and staked her own claims.

### PULLMAN COMPANY MUST CUT ITS RATES TO COAST

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 26.—The Pullman fares from St. Paul to northwest Pacific coast cities will be materially reduced by an order to be issued by the interstate commerce commission during next week. The commission has reached a decision in the case begun by the shippers' league, headed by George Loftus of Minneapolis. It is understood the commission will also include in the decision that the Pullman company must sell upper berths for less than lowers.

From the company's report, it is shown that originally its capital stock was \$1,000,000, and is now \$100,000,000. The entire increase does not come, however, from additional investment of new capital by stockholders, but by capitalizing the earnings.
