flames from the open craters, while cavernous rumblings and sharp detonations broke the silence.

They predicted that the most terrific upheavals are yet to come.

The damage resulting from the eruption, according to the conservative estimates, has already reached hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Homes Engulfed. Scores of homes have been engulfed by the lava, and entire orchards have been devastated and fields covered with the volcanic deposit.

The authorities late this evening ordered tents and other equipment sent to the hills behind Belgasso, where hundreds of refugees have gathered.

Food, it was stated, is plentiful, but there is no shelter for the homeless men and women. More than a hundred priests arrived here this evening to go among the sufferers.
