TURNING TO FARM LANDS OF NEW YORK

Steps Are Taken to Have Rural Districts of New York Settled by Immigrants Remaining in Big Cities

WASHINGTON, March 30.—Some of the up-state folk of New York have been, for a good many years, watching their farm lands go to grass and at the same time have seen hundreds of thousands of farmers pass through these lands for crowded cities, where their usefulness is lost, and where they usually became bad citizens. Last year nearly 600,000 immigrants entered at Ellis Island, a majority of whom were of the farming element of Europe.

Representative John W. Dwight, at a dinner given recently to Secretaries Nagel and Wilson, asked these gentlemen why New York state could not draw these men to its farms. Nagel told them there was a federal bureau of information to direct foreigners to farms where ever requested. This bureau he said would co-operate with the state.

But Dwight says New York is not satisfied with such co-operation and so will establish a bureau of its own to push immigration to these districts. The bureau will have its headquarters in New York City and will keep in constant touch with the farmers and small towns. Secretary Wilson lauded this plan and said he hoped soon to see it followed by other states.

AUSTRALIA SENDS OVER COUNTERPART OF TAFT

Has the Same Genial Smile, Ingratating Manner and Nearly Same Girth at Waistband.

LONDON, March 30.—The Australian commonwealth has sent over its first agent-general to the mother country in the person of Sir G. H. Reid, an ex-premier of the commonwealth. His resemblance to Mr. Taft is striking. Not only has he the same genial smile and ingratiating manner, but almost a similar girth. There is nothing that Sir George Reid resembles more than being called a huster. He says he never hustles, and never could hustle, but keeps steadily plodding away at the time when he is at work. When he is enjoying himself nothing will induce him to think of work or its worries. He is a peculiar and powerful man in the commonwealth, and unlike most other statesmen there, is a free trader.

ROAD CONGESTION IN FALL SAYS HILL

Tonnage Offered Roads Increasing Daily and by Fall There Will Not Be Enough Traffic Units to Handle It.

CHICAGO, Ill., March 30.—James J. Hill has predicted that the railroads of the United States will experience next fall the greatest traffic congestion in their history. He avers the opinion that there is no way to prevent this state of affairs and that shippers who dispatch goods during the congested period do so at their own risk.

"The tonnage offered the roads is increasing daily," Hill said, "and all indications are that before fall we will not be able to supply sufficient traffic units to care for it. Tonnage offered for shipment is growing at a much more rapid rate than are the facilities to handle it, and it does not take a mathematician to figure what these conditions will lead to. The roads are not to blame for this. It's next to impossible for them to raise money enough to make extensions as rapidly as they are needed.
