

### PROFESSIONAL MASSEUR FOR SENATE? NOT MUCH!

Solons Wax Sarcastic in Debate Over Bathrooms, Tubs and Other Fixtures.

WASHINGTON, April 1. — The United States Senate will get along without a professional masseur in the bathing rooms in the senate office building. The legislative Appropriation bill carried \$3960 for the salaries of the muscle worker, two attendants, and a janitor. Everybody was dumb today when the amendment was read and adopted. Two hours later Senator Bristow, who comes from Kansas moved to eliminate the provision. He did not try to pronounce the word "masseur," but simply referred to "Line 2 on page 112."

Senator Warren explained that all the men indicated were now on duty and had been paid from the lump sum set aside for maintaining the office building.

"Is there a bath room being run over there?" inquired Mr. Bristow.

"I presume so," parried Mr. Warren. "I know nothing about it. I do not have rooms over there."

"I never heard of that bath room," persisted Mr. Bristow.

The bathrooms ought never to have been there, persisted Mr. Bailey. A bath room is the highest achievement of modern civilization, but senators should provide and maintain their own. Those in the office building are palatial.

"The bath room is in operation," said Senator Burkett, who avowed that he had made it his personal business to look it over, although some portions of it were not yet ready for use.

Senator Burkett said he was not responsible for the term "professional masseur," but supposed it was the proper title.

"Have we heretofore had a professional masseur?" queried Senator Sutherland.

"I do not know how much of a professional he is," replied Mr. Burkett, but he assures me he came here from a reputable place and understood his business. I have never used that bath room."

The senate stuck out the provision for the masseur, and the bathing rooms will be in charge of the two attendants and a janitor.

### HARRIMAN HOTEL IS TO BE UNIQUE

\$100,000 Structure to Be Erected in Klamath Falls Is to Be Heated by Nature Through Hot Springs.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., April 1. —The Klamath Development company has matured its plans for the erection of a modern first-class hotel on the triangle opposite the offices of the company in this city a few blocks northwest of the depot of the Southern Pacific Railroad company.

The incorporators are Major C. E. Worden, William S. Worden and P. B. Houston, the latter to be president of the company and will have charge of the work of construction. The capital of the company has been placed at \$100,000, and articles of incorporation have been filed with the secretary of state. The hotel will be strictly first-class in every respect, will have electric elevators, telephones in all the rooms, will be heated with natural hot water from the medical springs of the development company and will be called the Harriman, in honor of the great railroad magnate who was an enthusiastic friend of the Klamath country.

### MANY MINOR CONTESTS ON LITTLE BUTTE

Final Hearing in the Matter of Adjudicating Water Rights on Little Butte Creek to Commence May 9.

H. L. Holgate, superintendent of water for the southern district, is in Medford on his way to Josephine county to examine some of the problems arising on the Applegate river. The state water commission will hold an investigation, commencing May 9, for the purpose of adjudicating the differences between the water users of Little Butte creek. Quite a number of contests have been filed between the several users, most of them of minor importance, but all tending to finally establish the actual rights of the water users of the stream.

The commission expects to have adjudicated the disputes within a week after the opening of the session.
