JACKSON BUYS SITE FOR JOURNAL

Will Erect Home for Paper at S. E. Corner of Yamhill and Seventh—Pays \$200,000 for Suitable Location and Will Build Soon.

PORTLAND, Or., April 1.—C. S. Jackson, publisher of the Journal, closed a deal yesterday with John C. Ainsworth, president of the United States National bank, for the purchase of the quarter block at the southeast corner of Seventh and Yamhill streets comprising lots 7 and 8, block 180. The price paid was \$200,000. The property was purchased with the intention of erecting upon it a building which will be the home of the Journal.

This property has been in the possession of the Ainsworth family for 60 years. Originally the holding comprised the whole block, bounded by Sixth, Seventh, Yamhill and Taylor streets. Two years ago the south half of the block was sold to the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. The quarter block at the southwest corner of Sixth and Yamhill is still the property of the Ainsworth company. The quarter purchased by Mr. Jackson is now occupied by the Buckingham hotel and one large frame residence.
