Charles W. Wilmeroth, for Thirty Years Chicago Commission Broker, Selects Rogue River Valley as Ideal Home and Orchard Section.

That the Rogue River valley raises the finest fruit in the world and is an ideal section not only for raising fruit, but as a place of residence, is the opinion of Charles W. Wilmeroth, a noted apple expert who has recently made investments here, and comes with the intention of making Medford his home.

For 32 years Mr. Wilmeroth has been in business of jobbing and marketing fruit, starting as a boy in a Chicago commission house and operating on South Water street for more than three decades. He knows about all there is to know regarding the science of marketing fruit, and is now interested in studying the methods of production. BASEBALL PRACTICE AND THE CRITICS

To the Editor:

I noticed in your last issue an article criticizing the ball team. The teams consist of players who work through the week and play Sunday ball. Last week the team practiced considerably. This week they were all working but two, but they practiced two evenings. Later they will practice four times weekly.

It is true that about 25 of our most loyal fans are contributing \$1 per week, and I want to thank them for their help. But if the team was to practice daily, the money would not more than pay for the balls used, allowing three for each practice. Heretofore when I have had the management of the ball team we have made as good a showing as other teams, and I think, better. Medford has seen both good and poor ball; but the trouble with fans is they expect too much, especially in the early season. There has always been something doing when I had the management of the team before, and I think it will be the same this year. I don't want to finance the proposition. It cost me \$1000 one season for salaries and boomer players, and I cannot finance such a team again. Now, fans, the only way you can find out about the Medford ball team is to come out and see them play today.
