ASHLAND LANDMARKS RAPIDLY GIVE WAY

Substantial Buildings Are Taking the Place of Shacks Which Have Long Stood in Neighboring City.

ASHLAND, Or., April 5.—Old landmarks are rapidly disappearing in Ashland and few of the real old-time buildings are left in the business district.

The latest shacks to disappear were those embraced in the wooden row on the west side of Main street directly over the bridge across Ashland creek. These were in the very heart of the business center of Ashland a few years ago. They were razed last week to make way for a new brick two-story block, which will have nearly 100-foot frontage extending to Granite street.

The new structure will be built by Mrs. Susie L. Allen and Major C. Cunningham, who bought out a non-resident shack owner who held six feet between them. The new block will represent an investment of \$25,000. The contracts have already been let. It will make one of the most marked transformations in the Plaza-Main street business district that has taken place in Ashland for years.

NON-PARTISAN ELECTION IS HELD IN TACOMA

TACOMA, Wash., April 5.—The first strictly nonpartisan election in the history of the northwest is being held here today to select a commission of five men under the new commission plan of municipal government.

Forty-six candidates are running and a majority vote is necessary to elect. If one is chosen on the first ballot a second election for the highest for each place will be held in two weeks.

No politics enters into the contest. All parties are barred by the charter from nominating and in the entire campaign no one has ever asked the party preferences of the candidates. The candidates have made their canvass on their positions on municipal ownership, enforcement of law, the gravity water question and opposition to control by corporations.

The people are also voting on spending \$2,000,000 to build the Green River gravity water system and for \$100,000 for storm sewers.
