## PIONEER ENJOYS FAMILY REUNION

Judge Gall, Resident of Jackson County Since 1852, Meets With His Ten Children in Pleasant Reunion in Ashland.

Judge Christopher Columbus Gall, a Jackson county pioneer of 1852, veteran of the Indian war of 1853 in this valley, who lived for more than half a century on the old farm in Sams Valley precinct in the northern part of the county, and for forty years of that time, until his resignation last October, successfully balanced the scales of justice and expounded the book of law in the local justice court for his district, and withal held the respect and esteem of his neighbors, gathered his ten children about him at the home of his son-in-law, Councilman William Myer, in Ashland, Saturday and the reunion made one of the happiest pages in the family history. A fine dinner was the feature of the festivities of the day.

Judge Gall is a native of Missouri and crossed the plains to Oregon in 1851, settling in Jackson county in September, 1852. October 9, 1861, he was married to Miss Sarah Pankey, a native of Illinois, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Pankey, early pioneers of this section of the state. Mrs. Gall passed away 18 years ago.

Their ten children who were all gathered together in reunion, Saturday, for the first time in 25 years, are as follows:

## OREGON GREAT STOCK COUNTRY

Great Returns Are Reaped by Farmers Who Have Foresight to Grow a Few Hogs and Cattle on the Side.

From a letter written by Dr. Withycombe, director of the Oregon Agricultural experiment station, the following extracts are taken:

The northwest offers unlimited opportunities for producing high class beef. Despite the fact that corn may not be available, other feed stuffs equally as good can be secured in great abundance. Good killing stuff can be secured from well cured or wild alfalfa hay. There is little waste in feeding well-cured alfalfa when cut at the proper season, but hay over ripe or coarse its value will be increased from 20 to 25 percent by running it through a cutter.

Some grain or succulent feed should be fed with hay to fatten cattle. In practically all the stock feeding districts the field pea or fodder can be grown. If these are ensiled and fed in the following ration—15 pounds of alfalfa or wild hay, 30 pounds of corn or pea silage and 5 pounds rolled barley, a gain of two pounds a day should be secured for a period of 90 days. It would put the steer in prime condition and thus add one to two cents per pound to the value of his initial weight.

Another excellent feed for fattening cattle is a combination of alfalfa and beardless barley hay. These may be grown separately or in many instances grown together advantageously. For example, fields where alfalfa is not thickly set should be thoroughly disced with a spike-tooth disc in the spring and beardless barley drilled in and the whole cut for hay. This combination is excellent for putting beef cattle in the very best condition for market.

Prime mutton can be economically produced from the same feeds suggested for the cattle. In eastern Oregon the principal winter fattening feed should be alfalfa and beardless barley hay and rolled barley. In western Oregon conditions are ideal for producing the highest quality of mutton and early market lamb. The winter feed should be clover and vetch hay, kale and rolled barley. These feeds can be produced in great quantities and cannot be excelled for mutton production. Much of the growth of sheep, however, in this section can be secured in the open field from rape and winter grain.

Hogs. Oregon is pre-eminently a hog country. No section can excel this state for quality of production when properly finished on home grown feed. Barley or wheat are the ideal fattening feeds for hogs. At the Oregon Experiment station in feeding experiments conducted during the past ten years, the average amount of wheat or barley required to produce one pound gain was four and one-half pounds. It was also ascertained that it cost from three and one-half to four cents per pound to grow a pig to a fattening age. This must be done, however, largely in the open field on alfalfa, vetch, clover or rape.

Pigs grazed on clover during the summer have given a return in growth of over \$40 per acre and from alfalfa even higher than this. Estimating that it costs four and one-half cents to grow the hog and when ready to be fattened he weighs 150 pounds, makes a total cost of \$6. After consuming 450 pounds of wheat or barley he should weigh 250 pounds and worth at seven cents per pound \$17.50, or giving a return for 450 pounds of wheat or barley of \$11.50. This gives a gross return to the farmer for his wheat of \$1.53 per bushel, and for his barley \$1.28 per bushel.
