

Vast Damage to Fruit Crops Reported From All Parts of the State-Smudge Pots, However, Saved Some of the Fruit.

SALT LAKE CITY, April 16 .-Heavy frost over Sait Lake and Provo valley and as far north as Cache valley last night caused a vast amount of damage to fruit crops, although in the larger orchards where smudge pots were kept burning the loss was comparatively light. Reports from other portions of the state and Idaho last night indicated that the frost was general over a wide area of country and that heavy damage would be reported today. The peach orchards, now in blossom, suffered the greatest loss, with apricots and cherries nipped in certain parts, but not generally.
